FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The most humbling seasons of the Christian year is Lent. On Ash Wednesday, we, as Christians reminded ourselves of our mortality and need for God's grace. As ashes are imposed, we remembered that God made us from the dust of the earth. One day all of us will return to the ground from which we were made. As we reflect on the mark of the cross, we remember our broken promises, unfulfilled commitments, damaging actions, and hurtful words. We acknowledge that we, as people whose sins Jesus suffered and died on the cross, are in need of God's grace and healing.

Family and friends, it is vital for us to embrace this solemn start to the Lenten Season because the rest of Lent can become a renewed commitment to discipleship. Once we establish our common starting ground as people in need of God's grace, we can embrace our journey of renewal filled with hope that Christ invites all people to follow him and grow in his likeness.

Lent is a time for us to take inventory of our lives, relate more intimately with God, and clear out those things that may distract us from our commitment to God. We must acknowledge things in our lives that have taken the place of God and prevent us from finding him. Maybe it's a schedule so full that there's no time for prayer and Scriptures. Or a heart full of resentment or preoccupied with material thing that there's no grace or space to connect with people. Or an addiction that has stopped us from being the parent, spouse, or child that our family needs and deserves. Lent is a time to clean out the debris in our lives and make room for new growth.

During Lent, the Church calls us to cast off the sins that hinder us from fully following Jesus. This is a time when we reaffirm our baptismal vows and "run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the author and perfector of our faith" (Hebrew 1:1-2) Lent is an opportunity for us to renewed Christian disciplines like prayer, fasting, reading Scripture and service.

As we prepare for spiritual growth, I encourage you and your family to join Sunday school, listen to Christian Music, and plan your activities around God rather than in place of God. If you cannot, I challenge you to faithfully attend Sunday worship services. You may even consider inviting a friend and/or family to worship with you for the next 40 days. Whatever you are able to do, let's strive to love God more deeply, serve God more passionately, and seek God more regularly.

Helpful Hints for Winter

- 1. Keep your headlights clear with car wax. Just wipe ordinary car wax on your headlights. It contains special water repellents that will prevent that messy salt mixture from accumulating on your lights and lasts six weeks.
- 2. Squeak-proof your wipers with rubbing alcohol or ammonia. This one trick can make squeaking and streaking wipers change to near perfect silence and clarity.
- 3. Ice-proof your windows with vinegar. Just fill a spray bottle with three parts vinegar to one part water & spritz it on all your windows at night. In the morning they'll be clear of ice. Vinegar contains acetic acid, which raises the melting point of water, preventing water from freezing.
- 4. Prevent car doors from freezing shut with Vaseline. Use a paper towel to rub it in on the rubber seals around car doors. This will prevent water from melting into the rubber.
- 5. Fog-proof your windshield with shaving cream. Spray shaving cream on the inside of your windshield and wipe it off with paper towels. Shaving cream has many of the same ingredients found in commercial defoggers.
- 6. De-ice your car door locks in seconds with hand sanitizer. Just put some hand sanitizer gel on the key and the lock, insert the key and the potential problem is solved.

March 29th 8:30— 10:45—Steve Walter January 26, marked the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz prison camps in Europe. The news said that 1.1 million Jews were murdered and that was one of the greatest genocides in history. I went to look up genocides on the Internet to see what they would say were the greatest or largest attempts to destroy people who wanted to be independent.

I was surprised at the numbers of what they said were the top 10, starting with Mao's revolution in China with 34 million people eliminated, including 30 million independent farmers. Then was Stalin in the Soviet union with 23 million eliminated, and Hitler in Europe eliminating 6 million Jews, Russians and Poles. As I went down the list I noticed the Turks eliminating 2.5 million Armenians, Greeks, and Assyrians, all Christians. And them Kim Sung eliminating 1.6 million dissidents and only God knows how many Christians.

That gets us into present day persecution and murder of Christians by Communist regimes and Islamic nations who view Christians as either heretics or people desiring to be independent and free. We can go down the list of Islamic countries like Egypt, Sudan, Libya, Algeria, Lebanon, Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Nigeria, Yemen and Syria. Many of those former regimes tolerated Christians before Islamic regimes took over. Many of these innocent people can be considered martyrs and there are organizations that seek to assist or rescue martyrs before it is too late, like Voice of the Martyrs.

Most of those countries don't keep records of who is killed or driven out of their country as refugees, so maybe the only way to find out is to question the refugees and survivors. And Christian churches in those countries that persecute may have information unless the churches are destroyed and the church leaders. Probably we won't know until we get to heaven or get together with the Lord at His coming.

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"Those Other Funds"

I had an inquiry a week or so ago about a church fund that they had started in honor of a relative some years ago. It was the Organ Fund, and I thought to myself that the church maintains several funds that you may not know about and that maybe I should describe a few of them.

The Organ Fund was established by a generous contribution from a member and so we established this fund. Since then additional contributions have been made to this fund by members who appreciate the church's pipe organ and wished to support it. When enough funds are available, the church plans to make some improvements to the organ's console, which is now very old and in need of help.

Often a fund is established to keep track of a fundraiser. Two examples are the pizza and cheesecake fund raisers. The proceeds of such funds are then transferred to another church fund such as the General Fund, but listing the details during the fundraiser helps to show its progress and proceeds.

As you may know, our church's Open Pantry is a major community outreach program. It started about 50 years ago as a small, old fashioned, kitchen pantry cabinet located in the lobby next to the doors to the sanctuary. It has grown over the years to a storage room full of groceries and bagging facilities. One source of its funding for food and vouchers are contributions made by local businesses, amounting to about \$25,000 a year!

A more remote outreach program of our church are the alternate-year trips to the Red Bird Mission in Kentucky where church members do repairs to the homes of poor families there. Funds have to be raised to support this work and pay for the housing and feeding of workers. These fundraisers can be tracked and supported until our next mission in 2016.

There are several more funds tracked by the weekly Treasurer's Report, some small and some large. You are free to provide support to any fund that you choose that might appeal to you, and as you can see from the Organ Fund story, suggest a new fund.
