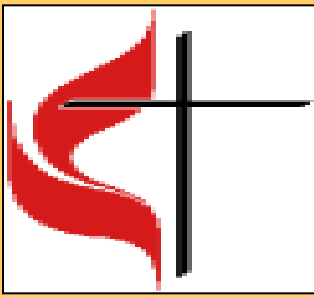

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A mom from our Happy Hands Methodist Preschool said the other day that she has been lonely and is looking for a church. Her statement challenges me to view church in a broader way. As we continue to explore about sharing our faith, viewing the church solely as a "Come-Structure" may be the wrong place to begin a discussion about evangelism. In my recent training for congregational development, I learned that we must perceive the church as a "Come-And-Go Structure." In addition to being the place for spiritual and moral instruction, the church historically has been a safe haven from oppression, a strategic planning center, an economic empowerment office, and a social gathering place. Even a person who did not attend church would embrace some definition of what church stood for to him or her and the community. At the training, we were challenged to define "church" and to think about what is involved with inviting an "outsider" to church.

Kena Kwasi, the coordinator of congregational development from General Board of Discipleship informed that before inviting people to come inside our church, we must trace the history of our congregation and consider the following types of questions:

- 1) *What significant events and ministries shaped our church's identity?*
- 2) *How do we describe who we are and what do we stand for?*
- 3) *What does our congregation call people to be and to do?*
- 4) *What, through Christ, does our congregation have to offer the people in the community?*
- 5) *Has our church developed a relationship with the community in any way?*
- 6) *Has our congregation connected with the people who have transitioned into the area?*
- 7) *Is our church aware of the major concerns of the people in the surrounding community?*
- 8) *What do people in this community expect from a church and what would make church meaningful for them?*
- 9) *Is our congregation's concept of church similar to or different from the concept of church held by people in the community?*
- 10) *If our congregation were to invite people from the neighborhood who have vastly different understandings of church, who bears the responsibility of bridging the communication gap?*

During my training in Portland, Oregon, I got a chance to attend worship at the church where I had grown up, 27 years ago. Unlike Lemont UMC, there were only two pillar families left and the rest of the congregation were new members to the church. They said that they have practiced the "Come-And-Go Structure" and their church attendance is close to 150 each Sunday. They claimed that "Going Out Precedes Coming In." To be an effective evangelistic congregation, we must concentrate on inviting people outside to "come" into the church and also equipping members inside to "go" out and reach people for Jesus. Let's go out to engage the world with the love of Jesus Christ. For the ministry of going out actually prepares us for the ministry of coming in. Jesus said to his disciples and also to us:

***"The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Luke 10:2***

**Books Available in the Library** By Kay Norfleet

“Pour out your heart like water before the face of the Lord. Lift your hands toward Him for the life of your young children.” That's what Lamentations 2:19 implores us to do. I'd like to leave out the word “young” so that the sentences encompass all our children. (Course I guess in relation to you, your children are young. Whatever.) Anyway, the Lord admonishes us to pray for them. I do, even though sometimes I'm not sure what I'm praying for. My kids are busy and not all of them live nearby, so I really don't know what's going on all the time. Even when they lived here I often didn't know what was going on. Enough about me. The Lord knows. They are his children. That's a relief, really, since you're not sure of the outside influences...friends, classes, transportation, health, language, interests...need I go on. Praying parents, that's a no-brainer. Remember, school is starting...that brings with it a whole new set of subjects to pray for. My first granddaughter is going off to college. I hope Taylor University knows what they're getting. Also I hope she knows what she's getting into, makes good decisions, etc. Although I've been told that they remind her 'God is in control' daily.

A fiction book, “The Yada Yada Prayer Group Gets Down” is about how some find a need to pray. The Yada Yada Group feels for prayer **all the time**. The book explains the personalities involved and the different situations that they think need prayer. Neta Jackson, the author, sets this story in Chicago, and many of the locations are familiar and some are fiction. The people are like those we might know...at least they remind us of someone. In other words, it is an easy book to read quickly. It is enjoyable. The book often causes a memory of something or some feeling we recognize. AND Yada Yada knows how important it is to pray. (Did I say that before?)

“Playing with a Purpose” is a compilation of stories of individual basketball players who have given their lives to the Lord. The book was put together by Mike Yorkey, who acknowledges that it was God who gave him the ability to put together this book, along with several -more than several- other books about sports, the people in them, and God who gives them purpose.

Did you know that the man who invented basketball was a Christian. His name was James Naismith, who saw basketball more as a ministry. He got the idea for basketball as a way to keep young men, restless from confining winter weather, busy. He got some help from the janitor at the YMCA where he was working. The janitor supplied James with two peach baskets which he stationed on poles on either ends of a playing area. And that was how basketball came into being. The book includes chapters on Kyle Korver, who plays for the CHICAGO Bulls, Anthony Parker, now Cleveland; Chris Kaman, Jeremy Lin.... Not only are these guys all enthusiastic Christians and athletes -surprise- each has had some conflict in their lives and they'll tell how the Lord has helped them work it out.

Sandy Patty, Christian vocalist, Grammy winner, is not a saint. Just like so many people in the Bible she has her flaws, some pretty major. Yet she admits them and winds up writing an enjoyable book that tells about how she wound up. “Life in the Blender” is about her now large family and tells their many bumps in the road of living and their practical decisions that helped smooth out those bumps, guess how they got them. The book has its funny and rather heartfelt moments. Only those who aren't saints should read it.

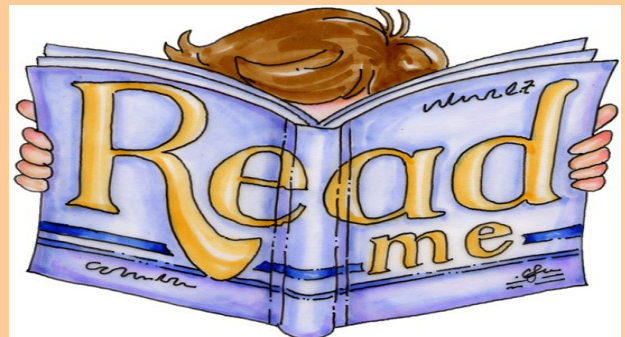

### The Greatest Misfits By Richard H. Lee

I never thought much about myself as a misfit until I heard it described as a person who is not worldly or “out of touch.” But in terms of modern technology I am definitely a misfit or technophobe. I struggle with making DVD videos and using things like chat media like Facebook. I had a new “Smartphone” but soon found it too complicated to use so took it back and was surprised to find the dealer didn’t want it back. People don’t return them except for a newer one.

The Bible has an interesting section that talks about Christians as “fools” or misfits I just read in 1 Corinthians chapter 4 especially verse 10. What the world calls popular and exciting is not interesting to me or most misfits of Christ. Paul himself was not a popular or well respected and was actually punished, pursued, whipped, and stoned by the Jews. The same is true of the disciples and Reformation leaders who became martyrs. Other terms related to misfits are foreigner, monk, and pilgrim.

Paul writes to the immature church at Corinth trying to prepare them for service with understanding. He describes misfits as: (1) **“We who bear His message”** in verse 9, (2) **“On stage where no one wants to buy a ticket”**, (3) **“like an accident in the street people stare at”** (4) **with frailties and uncertainties, mostly kicked around** in verse 11, and (5) **May not have enough to eat, wear old clothes, rejected, pick up odd jobs** in verse 12 (Message translation). But it gets worse. “We are called names, spread rumors about us, treated like worthless garbage, while we say, “God bless you” (v. 13). No wonder 80% of young people don’t want to be in church and leave the faith by the time they graduate. **They need a challenge and a purpose to be different!**

I recently received an email about letters that been written by the famous genius Albert Einstein to his daughter Leiserl. Einstein requested that these letters not be published until 20 years after his death. Below is a portion of the letter to his daughter.

When I proposed the theory of relativity, very few understood me, and what I will reveal now to transmit to mankind will also collide with the misunderstanding and prejudice in the world. I ask you to guard the letters as long as necessary, years, decades, until society is advanced enough to accept what I will explain below. There is an extremely powerful force that, so far, science has not found a formal explanation to. It is a force that includes and governs all others, and is even behind any phenomenon operating in the universe and has not yet been identified by us. This universal force is LOVE. When scientists looked for a unified theory of the universe they forgot the most powerful unseen force. Love is light, that enlightens those who give and receive it. Love is gravity, because it makes some people feel attracted to others. Love is power, because it multiplies the best we have, and allows humanity not to be extinguished in their blind selfishness. Love unfolds and reveals. For love we live and die. Love is God and God is Love. This force explains everything and gives meaning to life. This is the variable that we have ignored for too long, maybe because we are afraid of love because it is the only energy in the universe that man has not learned to drive at will.

There is more to the letter but I think you can see the message he was giving to his daughter and to us these 20 years later. **Happy Hands** still has a few openings, especially in our 11-12:30am 2s class. Preschool for 2-year olds? Absolutely! The program at Happy Hands is specifically designed for 2-year old children. The class meets for a short duration, two days a week. It is led by a loving, enthusiastic teacher with a maximum 8/1 child/teacher ratio. The biggest benefits children receive from this 2s program are an opportunity to play and socialize with children their own age, deal with separation, and build confidence. They will learn to share, take turns, and follow simple rules. However, this is much more than a play group since we focus on mental as well as social stimulation. The curriculum includes sensory, motor, perceptual, and language skills. Children will be exposed to colors, shapes, numbers, days, months, alphabet, sound recognition, and more. They will also enjoy music and motor skills as part of their daily activities. The 2s curriculum uses age-appropriate books, toys, and craft projects. We focus on encouraging socialization skills and introducing new concepts, while still allowing kids to be kids. Each child will attain his/her own level of successes and be celebrated without pressure. ## **Fiesta Ranch Chicken Pasta Salad**

1 pkg. of pasta (rotini, bowtie, tri-colored, etc)

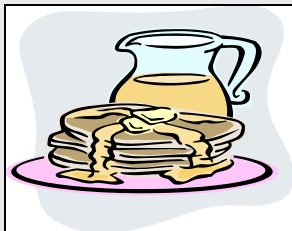
