FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

"Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving. At the same time, pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison, that I may make it clear, which is how I ought to speak." Colossians 4:2-3

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

What's it going to take to show and tell the gospel to resistant people?

As we think of showing and telling the gospel, here are some questions we need to ask: How do we share the gospel in a community in which many seem to be resistant? How can we share the gospel effectively? How can we, ordinary people, live on mission?

We live in a culture where church is not on the radar of most people. I have a friend who moved from Nashville. She told me that in Nashville, one of the first questions you'd hear is, "Have you found a church yet?" When they moved to Chicago, they discovered that you could be asked ten or twenty questions, but that wouldn't be one of them. We're not just dealing with un-churched people who may come back with the right programs or music; we're dealing with resistant people who don't think that Jesus or the church have anything to offer them.

In *Honest Evangelism*, Rico Tice says that people used to generally understand the gospel, so when Billy Graham came to town, they were ready to be invited and to respond. But then things changed. Nowadays, people don't engage with faith; they simply dismiss it. Jesus is not on the agenda or even an option to be considered. People don't think about why they disagree with Christianity; they just think it's fine for you and not for them. As a result, evangelism takes time and effort.

Paul gives three important clues about how we can share the gospel in a gospelresistant culture: It will take prayer, life, and speech. For this month let's look at prayer. Paul suggests in Colossians 4:2-3 If we're going to share the gospel, it's going to take prayer. We have a role, but if we ever think that we can accomplish what God has given us to do without prayer, then we're delusional. Unless God opens the door and unless God enables us through the Spirit, then we're sunk. Prayer is essential to evangelism.

Friends of mine wanted to see people come to know Christ in their neighborhood and workplaces so they went to Thailand and India to learn what effective missionaries do there. The missionaries said, "We don't understand what you Christians are trying to do back in North America. You are trying to serve God, but you're doing it without prayer." My friends told me that the main thing they learned is that if we are going to get the job done, especially in a resistant setting, it's going to take prayer. Not just general prayer, but tactical prayer. We're going to have to ask God to give us insight into particular situations, as well as to pray that God would opens doors and gives us clarity.

So how do we show and tell the gospel to resistant people? It begins with prayer. Our whole ministry must be bathed in prayer. Prayer is essential, but it is not everything. It's going to take something else. Stay tuned for next month.

Book and CD reviews for October, 2015

This month I'm including 4 CDs as ways to realize that God is in control. Music provides another way to worship Him. "Spiritbound," a vocal group, two "Symphony of Praise" instrumentals and "I'll Fly Away", a southern gospel recording by different vocal groups." This music is peaceful and directs your thoughts to worship.

"WWJD" is a book of short stories for teens. Hopefully, the stories address real life situations for teens. (I say hopefully because it's been so long since I was a teen. ((Of course when I was a teen....)) The book addresses and answers WWJD if a teen might encounter the problem of drugs, dating, temptation, truth or many others. The answers certainly supply food for thought.

"Help Lord! I'm Having a Senior Moment." Notes to God on Growing Older. And aren't we all? Maybe you won't connect now with the "Dairy Queen" story of not so exact memory or "Tell It Again, Sam" a complete loss of memory. But, believe me, you will. The stories are followed by appropriate Bible verses to remind us how God's truths apply to seniors. We've all heard about Christians in different countries being punished for their faith.

"Hearts of Fire" is a book which tells of eight women who were punished. The consequences of their decisions did put them in peril, yet the Lord sustained them. How often do we pray for the Lord to save them from that punishment? How often do we try to help their situations? There is a song about someone distressed over the world situation, and he asks of the Lord, why? The next line of the song is the Lord's answer "I made you," which means the Lord made us to alleviate some of the world's suffering. If we ask for wisdom, He will give it abundantly. Then we'll know what we can do. This book reminds us how fortunate we are to be where we are and have what we have.




ESL Tutoring

Crushed Red Potatoes...Yummy!

12 whole New Red Potatoes (or Other Small Round Potatoes) 3 Tablespoons Olive Oil Kosher Salt To Taste Black Pepper To Taste Rosemary (or Other Herbs Of Choice) To Taste



INSTRUCTIONS

BRING A POT OF SALTED WATER TO A BOIL. ADD IN AS MANY POTATOES AS YOU WISH TO MAKE AND COOK THEM UNTIL THEY ARE FORK-TENDER. ON A SHEET PAN, GENEROUSLY DRIZZLE OLIVE OIL. PLACE TENDER POTATOES ON THE COOKIE SHEET LEAVING PLENTY OF ROOM BETWEEN EACH POTATO. WITH A POTATO MASHER, GEN-TLY PRESS DOWN EACH POTATO UNTIL IT SLIGHTLY MASHES, ROTATE THE POTATO MASHER 90 DEGREES AND MASH AGAIN. BRUSH THE TOPS OF EACH CRUSHED PO-TATO GENEROUSLY WITH MORE OLIVE OIL. I USE A LITTLE BUTTER AS WELL BE-CAUSE I LIKE THE BUTTERY FLAVOR. SPRINKLE POTATOES WITH KOSHER SALT, FRESH GROUND BLACK PEPPER AND FRESH CHOPPED ROSEMARY (OR CHIVES OR THYME OR WHATEVER HERB YOU HAVE AVAILABLE.)

BAKE IN A 450 DEGREE OVEN FOR 20-25 MINUTES UNTIL GOLDEN BROWN. THIS IS A GREAT ALTERNATIVE TO A DIFFERENT KIND OF POTATO.

The Greatest Immunity

I attended a lecture and lunch with my daughter who has MS and learned a lot about immunity. MS is one of many auto-immune diseases where our immunity system goes wrong and attacks healthy cells of the body. Some drugs suppress the immune system to lessen the symptoms but these drugs can be expensive.

I was surprised to hear that MS patients should not take supplements that boost the immune symptoms because it could increase the disease symptoms. Then I was studying the Bible book of James where James talks about temptations in chapter one and realized that we need more immunity to temptations. This could be one of the greatest kinds of immunity that we need. James has a prescription for this problem and says, "Temptation comes from the lure of our own evil desires" (1:14 NLT) and the lure of pleasures from the world.

Boredom is one worldly cause of temptation. Here we seek excitement and TV is another where we are flooded with messages or images of immorality, greed, and violence. So should we watch less TV? I think so and most movies being produced today are also bad. One reason people go to live in a monastery is to escape the temptations of the world and focus on the life with God. My Life Application Study Bible says in a footnote, "We can resist the temptation to sin by turning to God for strength and choosing to obey His Word." To believe that we can be saved by good works in spite of our sin is not reality and Paul states this clearly in Ephesians 2:8-9.

Another great help is to listen to good Gospel songs about dealing with this problem, like, "Abide With Me", "Breathe" (I'm desperate for You), and "One Day At A Time" (sweet Jesus).

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"Christian Outreach"

I am often surprised by the many Christian outreach activities conducted or sponsored by our church. Oh, I don't mean the Happy Hands Preschool, the Open Pantry, or the Daybreak Homeless Shelter dinner program, since these are obvious and long-standing examples. What I mean are the many smaller activities that pop up from time to time. The recent School Supply fund raiser and the crop walk program just a few weekends ago. On any given week there might be a pizza pie sale or a cheesecake sale to raise funds for the church.

I was reminded personally of an outreach activity when I was treated to a loaf of bread and jar of jelly when I underwent a medical problem. I suspect I was the beneficiary of our expanding Care Bear Ministry. This program is set up to reach out to those in need due to medical or other personal problems or that may be patients in a hospital.

Next year some of our church members will be traveling to the Red Bird Mission in Kentucky to perform some needed home repair for a needy family there. My wife and I participated in a few of these missions some years ago and found them very rewarding to the families there and to us church members as we conducted a stewardship that raised a sweat instead of just writing a check.

In preparation of the coming Charge Conference where we are visited by an official from the United Methodist Church and present our church's condition and programs, I had to prepare a budget for next year. This budget is divided into several "missions," this first of which is the "Mission of Outreach." This includes our Conference Apportionments which is our outreach beyond our area and country, and the many other programs such as the Red Bird Mission, the Open Pantry, special offerings, and the use of our church by other programs. The interesting aspect of this mission category is that the total amount calculated for it amounts to about 20% of our total budget for the year! When this fact was presented in last year's Charge Conference, our apportionment was actually lowered slightly for the following year in recognition of this fact.

So keep up the good work you Christian Outreaching members of our church.
