Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We have been in the season of Lent since Ash Wednesday February 10th and it will last until Easter, March 27th. But do you know what Lent is and when is Lent? Lent is a season of the Christian Year where Christians focus on simple living, prayer, and fasting in order to grow closer to God. Lent is the forty days before Easter, excludes Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. Basically, it's about one-tenth of a year (like a tithe of time). During Lent this year, I would like to help our church refuel, refresh and refocus by building the rhythm of our weeks around Sundays. There will be five weeks sermon series of "I Love Sundays." I encourage you to begin something transformative: Make Sundays your priority.

In each of the sermon, there will be encouraging steps for you to apply in order to make Sunday the best day of your week. Sunday after all is like a little Easter, and when you come to worship God on Sundays, you are tithing your time. Here are the highlights of the suggested applications.

1) Decide to let Sunday be the best day of your week. For your life to improve, you have to make a decision to let it improve. Decide to come to church regularly. Decide to make a commitment to it. Decide to get involve.

2) Invest in your Sundays. Church is no different than anything else--to get something great out of it, you have to put something great into it. Invest your heart in church.

3) Honor God's rhythm for your life. "Observe the Sabbath day and keep it holy, as the LORD your God commanded." Deuteronomy 5:12.

4) Prepare for Sunday as if it's the highlight of your week. When King David gets invited to go to church. He was all fired up about it and said, "I rejoiced with those who said to me, Let us go to the house of the LORD!" Psalm 122:1

5) Make Sunday family day. Anchor your Sundays in church then continue spending quality time together at home and beyond.

6) Explore God. Be in nature to experience this incredible place God has made for us.

7) Serve together. Find something to do around church regularly as a family. It would help our entire church family and really benefit your family for a long, long time.

8) Invite friends and family to church or welcome new members of God's family.

9) Thank God that you are part of His family.

10) Be the church. The outcome of great Sundays ought to have an effect on the world we live in. Come to church every week, but along with coming to church, be the Church.

I went out to my car this morning (2-15-2015) to get my compact Bible New Testament and it was ice cold! The temperature outside was about zero so you would expect it to be cold, but it was too cold to handle! Then I started thinking about how most people who have Bibles treat them as if they were "ice cold."

What that means to me is that people put them in a bookcase or on a shelf where they are forgotten. I try, on the other hand, to always have a Bible with me and take either a compact New Testament that will fit in a pocket or jacket and have Bibles in various places. I have one where I work part time in a bookcase where I can look up something or share with a coworker. But it isn't necessary to have one to carry since we can connect to the Internet and find one of many in various translations. I like to use www.biblegateway.com to look up key words or Bible verses and you can select and read chapters or books of the Bible and compare translations.

I think the important thing is not to have one available all the time but learn the message or truth of the Scriptures either in word or as images. Images? Yes, videos and even still paintings or photos can have a scripture text or quote to enrich or stimulate the mind and they can be viewed on a call phone or portable tablet or laptop computer. Scripture is not "ice cold" if you have it recorded in your mind or portable player, such as the gospel song I was humming today, "One Day Jesus" about when he calls our name to come to Him.

March 2016 book reviews

Dale Jansen donated Paula's books to our church. First of all, I thank Dale. Next I want to tell you that we have established a library specifically for Paula because some of the books seemed more personal to her. I moved a few of her books to the church library. Among them is one called "Parables from the Back Side." If you recall, one of the admonitions that the Pastor gave us in her Lenten messages was to allow our curiosity to expand. That's certainly what the writer of this book does. He takes the parables of Christ: the Good Samaritan, The Prodigal Son, the Lost Coin, The Fig Tree are some, and asks us to go beyond what Jesus' words said. What did they imply? He asks us to imagine several conclusions. For example, the prodigal son. Jesus sets the stage and tells us a bit of the homecoming. Why the father rushed to meet the younger son, the effect on the older son who had stayed at home. Certainly we know the message of that parable. But what else? Did the older son forgive his brother and welcome him back? What were his emotions? The younger son had come Home. The older, was dismayed by his return, only thought of himself when he saw his father's reaction. What do you think Christ wants us to see in this parable? Seems to me it's a lot like the shepherd who searched for a lost sheep? One sheep was important as was one brother in the parable. But then was the other brother displaying God's love? Are we happy or envious of another who has returned to God's trust?

Several years ago, well let's face it, about twenty, my older son, who was in a hurry to get on with his life, that is leave home and marry his girlfriend, came up with Bill Hybels "Too Busy Not to Pray." That was sort of a turning point for him, and me. He settled down, prayed himself through college into a good job and showed me, and others, probably, that he was serious about this relationship he had with God. He realized his need for His Guidance...and is still doing so. Oh, he had gotten a lot of good Sunday school knowledge, three very good youth group leaders plus a caring pastor, and I hope a little something from home, but this book seemed to wave a stop sign in front of his face, and force him to slow down. By the way, he married an entirely different girl. Thank you, God. I think that the book espouses a way of life that is pleasing to the Lord: SLOW DOWN, look around you, see that HIS creation is good, except what man has messed up. Pray to the One Who has given us that creation. Pray that we handle it as He would like. Pray that as His creation we don't veer off track too much and do live a life that is one He approves of. (Thanks to Paula for this gem.)

"The Secret Supper" is an historical thriller book by Javier Sierra. Look at the men in the painting, study them. One of the reviews tells us that we will never look at the famous painting again in the same way. It points out different clues that mystified the Pope of the day. With the time for our spoken Last Dinner coming up, we might fine relevancy in this. And our curiosity might be peaked. Whatever, Leonardo has again given us something to think about... . "Why is the Mona Lisa smiling," is the another mystery posed about one of his paintings. (Thanks again to Paula.)

Karen Kingsbusy and Gary Smalley have written a book called "Return." It's about a guy who can't accept the New York tragedy on Sept. 11, 2001 and a girl who does and... . The characters, and there are many, have a relationship with God...whether good or bad, you decide. However, of course, God dictates the ending...as always. That's something we all know.



Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"One Great Hour of Sharing"

When I get emails from the greater Methodist Church that tell about its activities and outreach, I always try to find examples to inspire our congregation's giving. I know that you contribute because you are Christians and you know that you should help do God's work with your contributions. But seeing examples of what is being done with your contributions may inspire you to continue your giving.

A recent email was about the coming special offering called "One Great Hour of Sharing" and its mission of supporting the United Methodist Committee of Relief, or UMCOR. Here is the body of the message:

In less than one month, we will celebrate One Great Hour of Sharing. This is a crucial Sunday for us because it is the day we come together to empower our disaster relief arm of Global Ministries, UMCOR, for an entire year. If you remember,

- When tornadoes hit Mississippi, UMCOR was there.
- When fires ravaged thousands of homes, UMCOR was there.
- When Syrian refugees needed help, UMCOR was there.
- When a typhoon in the Philippines displaced tens of thousands of people, UMCOR was there.

• When an earthquake and a tsunami decimated villages in Japan, UMCOR was there. They were there because of One Great Hour of Sharing.

This One Great Hour of Sharing covers the operating costs of UMCOR, which allows UM-COR to be where it needs to be, when it needs to be there, for as long as it needs to be there ... and allows UMCOR to funnel earmarked donations directly to the designated project.
