# The New Wine

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I hope and pray that you are having a restful and enjoyable summer. It was a few Sundays ago during children's time when many of us were stunned by one of the children who shared that he is scared of terrorists. Unfortunately, even in the eyes of the boy, our world seems full of fear due to the terrorist attacks, gun violence, racism, and hate and many more. It is sad and heartbreaking that our children are living in and seeing the world this way.

One of the reasons for that, I ponder, is the generations before the children who grew weary and lost their hearts. We as adults, parents, or grandparents tend to fix our eyes on the political system, political leaders, customer goods, economy, and TV news. We are scaring the children. Since our children are getting cues from us, we are giving them "O my goodness we don't get the right people in office, if we don't fix our economy, it is the end of the earth, O my goodness, we don't get the right policies, and O my goodness, eventually all come in rebel.

Though the government, the economy, and the policies matter, neither of those matters as much as men and women who understand faith. God made the covenant with us and became one of us in Jesus to show us how much God loves each everyone of us. We have Jesus, who is abiding with us in Spirit, who understands our struggles and pain, and who even overcame evil and death. There is nothing to fear. Instead, we need to model for the next generation about faith that God is in control, God is with us, God is at work, and God can be trusted. All we need to do is to fix our eyes on Jesus while involving things in our community, government, economy, and politics, so that our children find hope in and through us for times such as these.

Since I am new to Lemont and have felt anxiety and uncertainty about how things are going to work out, I have walked around the city for several days. It has helped me know the community better and enable me to pray for the city and the people. At the beginning of the prayer walk, the city seemed like a huge fortress that I could not climb or conquer. Yet, one morning, suddenly, it turned to be the very beautiful city to live in and beautiful people to minister to. No matter how small I am, how capable I am, and how scared I am, God has given me strength, peace, and faith to cope with while praying. With this conviction in mind, I move on with my fingers crossed, hoping and believing that God is on my side and works in and through me. I believe God will show His presence in whatever I do, pour His blessings upon those whom I bless, and use me to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world through the power of the Holy Spirit.

I am sure it is not only my calling but also all of us who are called by God as ministers in the business of transforming lives. A prayer walk or prayer calms us down and helps us overcome our fears. One of my previous parishioners has been praying whenever there is a siren going on in town. When she babysits her grandson, she stops whatever she is doing and holds the hands of her grandson and offers a prayer. What a good example of faith! She has been modeling to her grandson how to manage fear and showing what faith looks like. It is a good idea that you sit with your kids since they are going back to school soon and listen to what they are afraid of and pray together. Remembering that we have Jesus, we have stories to tell, and we have faith granted to us, let us fix our eyes on Jesus. In doing so, surely our children and grandchildren, and great-grandchildren will face the future unafraid and our world will be a better place to live. Fingers crossed~!!!

# The Greatest Speaker 2 By Richard H. Lee

Our new pastor spoke recently about how public speaking was a great problem for her in her early years of her ministry. But obviously she has overcome that fear and that reminded me of my years in Toastmasters at Argonne National Lab. I joined that group to learn how to speak at conferences and soon learned the basics and got guided practice.

One of the most important things to become a good speaker is to know what you are talking about. And be prepared for people asking you questions after your speech, which is common at a conference. A third important rule is to use humor in your speeches to make them more interesting and entertaining. But don't try to be a stand-up comedian unless the subject needs some humor or you want it to be more entertaining.

I am reminded of one of my favorite speakers, Abraham Lincoln, who was known and respected for his knowledge of the facts and the morality of it. He was also known as a good storyteller, which helped him work with his opponents and enemies. Yes, he had enemies! Sometimes he would quote Scripture and was known to be a student of the Bible. There is a church in Chicago, Saint James that I have been to and seen the memorial plaque in the lobby honoring Lincoln who attended there sometimes. Moses was another man who was timid and afraid of being a spokesperson until he received orders and encouragement from God personally. This was at the age of 80, so it's never too late!

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

# "The Capital Repair Fund has Started"

Well, the new Capital Repair Fund (CRF) has been established with \$20,000 from the Endowment Fund and two member loans totaling \$40,000. Money has been taken from this fund to pay for some of the work already billed and under way. I have learned that there may be other members who wish make a loan to the CRF and they would be welcome. Just contact Don Mueggenborg for instructions.

The work on replacing the leaking underground electrical supply system and new interior electrical equipment is now complete and we have a much safer system for the church. Later this year the renovation of the side gardens and construction of the sidewalks to the lower entrances will be completed and more bills will be paid by the CRF.

It is now our turn to contribute to this fund to pay back the loans. This will be one of the subjects of my stewardship talks this fall but early contributions will be welcome. Just mark your envelope with "Capital Repair Fund" or just "CRF."

With our contributions to the CRF over the next few years, our member loans and the Endowment Fund can be paid off. And we will have accomplished a great set of improvements, many of them safety improvements, to our church for those who follow us here.

#### **August Book Reviews**

Gratitude is a prerequisite to giving (generosity). Gratitude means thankfulness, thankfulness to God who is in charge. That thankfulness results, or should result in, generosity (giving)." When we practice gratitude that should result in generosity, not only do we grow in our trust of God. We benefit physically, emotionally, and spiritually." Really thinking of a Christian response to the situations that confront us opens our minds to ways we can show our generosity (gratitude to God who has allowed the situations we find ourselves in). Gratitude (generosity) is our finding ways to help our neighbors. That is completing one of God's commandments. So think, think, think whenever you experience a situation whether it be when you open your refrigerator and find food that you could donate to food pantry. OR if you hear of a person experiencing a health crisis, pray, and tell them you are praying. Pray with them. A gratitude journal is an excellent way for each of us to track what God has put in our paths. ...whether it be positive or negative. Then maybe we'll know what to do to please Him

Debbie Macomber in this book "One Simple Act" recounts how Corrie ten Boom remembered her situation in the Nazi prison camp. She had been housed with many other women in a place that was infested with fleas. She had used her Bible to bring comfort to those sisters. However, the Nazi guards were supposed to confiscate any Bible. But because of the fleas, they would not enter the room where Corrie and the women were kept. So, strange as it seems to us, Corrie gave thanks for the fleas. You may, and I have seen people do this, pay for someone else's meal or groceries when they can't. It's appropriate then for you to give thanks to God that you were able to help. You may send a card or letter to comfort or wish someone a happy day or ???, but you don't see a return envelope. Yet you are able to thank God for that empathy. If you hear of someone going through a difficult time, don't just say "I'm praying for you," offer a prayer right at the time, whether written or softly, but clearly said. In her book, Debbie Macomber writes short stories that display the act of giving. Be like Pollyanna, look for something in everyone, and thank God you can see it. Then act upon it. Be generous.

Deep in the mountains of Romania stands a fortress, and deep within that fortress lies a chamber. In that chamber, ruling the dead for over two thousand years, lives one Shataiki bat straight from the bowels of the Black Forest. He seeks the final Books of History with which he will destroy the world. But there are four who stand in the way. The Chosen are trapped in a new world of high technology and weapons of mass destruction. In the midst of chaos, they must find the last book before the Dark One can in this final test to save the world. Ted Dekker's "Chaos" is a young adult book that pits the forces of good and evil, the choices the characters make bring focus to their final mission. A summer read that takes you away from too many screens or ipads or whatever those things are called.

The book reminds us that it isn't necessary to be a prolific writer or public orator to share what we have as Christians, we can do that by Acting out our faith...by doing as the book of James reminds us: SHOW that we know and serve a God who we know is in charge,


who made the earth, man, animals, all things and who gives good things to those of us who delight in him and praise him continuously. Or in other words, act out the fruits of the Spirit. Oh I don't mean that we need to be mumbling praises always, although that's a good start. (I remember being put on hold on the phone one time, but the person at the other end, hadn't pressed the right button, and I heard her saying over and over "PTL.") But what we need to do is be open to whomever, to really LISTEN and empathize and try to meet the needs of all we come in contact with. Does the person need a ride? If you have a car you can meet that need. Is the person in any way handicapped? Go with him so he feels more secure in walking. What about making a phone call if he or she doesn't feel good about calling. Maybe you can. Of course, anyone who needs errands done, a house cleaned, children taken care of, or maybe at work carrying or going out of your way to find something, listening to what is said-if you are able to meet a need, even if all you do is try, is a fruit of the Spirit. Anyone who is shown a fruit of the Spirit, again and again is more likely to trust you. Then you'll need to go slowly-pray and ask God to change you so you may bring another into His kingdom.

Another Ted Dekker book, one that I think adults might enjoy, besides young adults, is "Sinner." Think forward eighteen years, there is a new society. People whose world is governed by "Tolerance." Yet there are a few who exist who don't think like the majority. Their lives are in danger. Mixups, a guy who can read minds, a woman whose very words can change a situation, a group in Washington who is opposed to the tolerant group...all these add up to an easy and light summertime read.




# ALPHA CLASS

# **LUMC WORK PROJECTS FOR 2016**

Church members have noticed the piles of dirt and construction barricades blocking the front of the church. The summer work projects have progressed quickly.

We started on a special landscaping project which removed many of the old plantings on both sides of the church. The area is being treated with weed and grub eradication chemicals and will lie fallow until the landscaped walls are installed and much needed sidewalks are poured.

The project involving ComEd, Fail Safe Electric, U. S. Waterproofing, Arris Architects, and AMSCO Engineering has replaced the access piping for the main electrical line to the building. The new line runs under the south driveway and the work has been completed and passed inspection. This work will insure the safety of our electrical system and improve the waterproofing of the lower level.

We still need to install the landscaping wall along the north driveway, install new sidewalks to meet handicap accessibility standards, and resurface and restripe the parking lots and driveways. Hopefully this can be done before late fall.

We are trying to keep costs as low as possible, but we will continue to need the help of the congregation for these projects. Donations to the Maintenance Fund at LUMC will be important and greatly appreciated as we try to keep our church safe and sound.
