Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last spring, I purchased two pots of Superbells, brought them to Lemont, and placed one in the porch and the other in front of the yard. Ron Walter gave me one more pot of the flower as a gift. So three of them were healthy, vibrant, and blooming beautifully since there were a lot of rainy days throughout spring and early summer. I also watered them often. Yet, since I was busy with my ministry in the new church, I didn't water or pay attention to them at all. As a result the one on the porch began to wilt and soon after completely died. The other two flowers outside have been surviving by the rain during the summer and fortunately they are still beautifully blooming and make the front of the parsonage look cheery. The same is actually true in all aspects of our lives such as our faith, marriage, friendships, and our jobs. Especially, when we have long periods of inattention to our spiritual life, our passion, our relationships, or vitality goes dormant. We call it burnout.

Therefore, we need revival from time to time in every part of our lives. In my life as a pastor, I have had times when I experienced spiritual burnout. There are times when my faith has ebbed, when I have become too busy doing things pastors must do to tend to my spiritual life and wellbeing. I felt inwardly empty, though I had outward appearance of spiritual vitality. The one whom I closely work with could sense a reduction of the fruit of the Spirit in my heart, words and actions. I sensed no energy or passion to continue to move on. Rather I was overwhelmed by the responsibilities, filled with a lot stress and felt ready to quit. I am in need of revival from time to time. No wonder that statistics show a significant number of people leaving the ministry during the first five years of ministry.

I am sure that I am not the only one. I assume that many of you have experienced a need of revival in many aspects of your life especially in your faith. Even some of the earliest believers in the churches in Ephesus in the book of Revelation lost their vitality and became lukewarm" (Revelation 3:16). The Christians were busy, no longer produced spiritual vitality, and lost their first love. Thus, the Lord told them to revive their spirituality by doing the works they did at first (Revelation 2:5). We are all prone to wander and prone to leave the God we love (from Hymn-"Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing).

John Wesley, who was the founder of Methodism, also felt that spiritual vitality was ebbing in many parts of the Church of England and longed for revival, and sowed the seeds of the Methodist church. He became one of the precursors in reviving not only the Church of England, but also in America. His mother, Susanna Wesley, prayed for him and spiritually mentored him. John also had "Catholic Spirit" which is humble and willing to see the important truths on both sides of theological divide in his time. He also learned perseverance in the face of opposition from his father, Samuel Wesley, who was the Anglican Church pastor at St. Andrew in Epworth, who underwent a lot of opposition and adversity, but never gave up. He inquired members of the societies to share how their souls prosper every time he opened up small group gatherings in order to watch over and help each other so that they would not fall away from faith, holiness, and burnout.

With these in mind, it is very important for Christians to get together in worship to listen to the Word of God, to renew our spirits and to be empowered by each other's presence. Since it is a time to go back to church from the summer break and activities, I would like to invite you to join our services, Sunday school classes, and home gatherings. We will go back to two services: traditional 8:30 am and contemporary at 10:45 a.m., starting from September 11th. Come and renew. Come learn and grow. Come get some help from each other. I've been preaching on "How Is It with Your Soul?" sermon series, focused on pray, learn, mentor, and transform. I believe these series will help us grow together, restore our spiritual practices, become stronger and healthier, and finally turn to God after a period of burnout. 
## **Sanctuary Volunteers Are Needed!**

#### **The Greatest Titles 2**

I was thinking recently about the titles we have from our occupation or role in local affairs. My most recent title or job description was analyst, and more frequently now is grandfather or "Papa." How we address people is important and we use such titles as mister, doctor, instructor and pastor or minister.

It is good manners or practice to address people you serve or work with as mister or missus and the Japanese I used to work with used the term, \_san at the end of your name to mean mister. Now that I am retired I have spent a lot of time writing so I guess that would make me an author or writer and I still enjoy photography so I am an amateur photographer or artist. When I was working at Argonne I was a scientific photographer specializing in images from microscopes.

But there are also titles of people in the Church of a spiritual nature, such as administrative assistant, teacher, trustee, liturgist, and choir director or organist that are all part of the body. The Church is a body, the body of Christ, and all have a function or part. Ministers should shine brightly says Jesus in Matthew 5 in the Sermon on the Mount and if you look at the Beatitudes you will see different aspects of followers, such as "poor" (in Spirit), humble (servant), seekers, merciful, pure, and peacemakers. This is what we should strive to be in our own special way but may be limited to one or two aspects. Another wonderful title that Paul uses in Philippians 3:20-21 is, "Citizens of heaven" and glorious! Remember Paul uses the term "saints" to describe believers frequently.

One more title I like is in Revelation 3:5, the "victorious"!

### **Stewardship Minute**

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

## "What is Stewardship?"

As you may know outreach comes in many forms. We make donations to worthy causes, we give things we don't need to needy people, and we help out our friends and neighbors when they need our help. However, Christian Stewardship has a somewhat different meaning. To a Christian stewardship means the giving to those in need a part of what we have been given since we are "stewards" of that gift.

Jesus spoke of this many times as he replied to those asking what they should do to become a follower of his. In the end, stewardship means not giving whatever loose change you may have, or some amount you would never miss. It means to give an amount that would make a difference to your life – an amount you would notice.

Sometimes that gift will take the form of working to help others. Our church's every-two-year mission to the Red Bird Mission to help poor people there is a good example. Another example is our Open Pantry where gifts of food and packaging work helps to feed poor and hungry people of our region. Each month our church collects casseroles and other food to feed the homeless at a shelter in Joliet.

Another form of church stewardship is the many jobs done by the Trustees and others as they work to keep our church safe and attractive. Then there are the teams of church grass mowers to cut the grass each week to save the church form having to pay to have it done.

The larger United Methodist Church is another form of stewardship because it uses our monthly contributions to reach out and help many in our region, our country and beyond.

So, please continue to try and be a good steward of what all you have been given. Help those in need, help your church reach out and feed those nearby and in Joliet, help to make our church safe and attractive.

## Books Available in the Library By Kay Norfleet

#### September 2016 book reviews

"Hidden in Plain Sight" by Mark Buchanan is one of the books Paula Janssen added to our library, which I'm thankful she shared. Her underlining's in the book help point out the importance of what Mark Buchanan, the author, is saying. Mr. Buchanan uses Peter of the Bible as an instrument to show how God showed him that we need to have faith to take that step to leave our comfort zone, to address a new God-inspired ministry. We need to have faith-faith that God did create the universe, our world, nature, man (and woman). Then we need to practice the seven virtues enumerated in the book AND STEP OUT. FAITH in God is most important. "Without faith, it's not only impossible to please God-to have a friend (such as Jesus). Yet our faith needs to produce good works. Look around you for them: work at the food pantry, then go a step further, see what one of the recipients needs and provide it.. i.e.: He doesn't have a car that works, you do, so use it for him. OR That guy next door is out looking for work, do work on his house that he can't because he doesn't have the time. OR Those kids are failing in school, tutor them. But don't be proud of yourself because of these good deeds. Instead thank God that you are in a position to do them. You will have stepped out for God-you will be out of your comfort zone, however He will guide. Peter was a good example of a man who had a few hiccups along life's way, but then realized that he should be in a better position, and was. Sound familiar? He practiced faith and the ensuing good works. Mark Buchanan says he learned humility from Peter: It's not important to please yourself, to use whatever goods you have for yourself, it's more important to use your God-given gifts to please Him.

"Powerful Prayers for Troubled Times" includes prayers not only for personal troubles, but prayers for our nation, in this time of political unrest, unrest of population, And those prayers are needed. We cannot arrange things ourselves. God is in control, we need to be in communication with Him. Of course, He knows what is happening, however He wants us to ask-plead-pray for our nation. In the books on prayer in the library we are directed to pray for the future-for the future of our families, for the future of our neighbors, for the future of the earth God gave us. ALSO, we must pray for America to turn back to God, otherwise we might lose our religious liberties. Pray for those in authority and who want to be in authority. Pray that they have Godly thoughts. We must pray that those who are put in authority will appoint Supreme Court judges to up hold the Constitution. Pray for those leaders who don't know Christ to be led to true knowledge. Notice the preposition "for" is used a lot. "For" is used to indicate the purpose of an action. Isn't that what God wants us to do?" Pour out your heart like water before the presence of the Lord; lift up your hands to Him."for the persecuted Christians in the world. Lamentations 2:19 Pray

Finally, or should I say firstly, praise Him that put us where we are and gave us so much. "Hearts of Fire" is a book about some of the underground churches and the Christians who populate them. Persecuted Christians. It's a story of their costly faith. This book was put together by an organization called Voice of the Martyrs, they interviewed the women, in secret, to try to ensure their relative safety. The book describes what we in America don't have to look forward to. I wonder if we did, what would happen. Anyway, you can see courage talking. Obviously it's non-fiction.

A fiction book is "Sinner" written by Ted Dekker. There's a reason why the author is so successful. His descriptions, storyline, characters, insight are so superior that if you read it, you'll be mesmerized. He is able to express the character's thoughts in a way that is so reasonable and fitting to that situation.

Remember always God is in control.

## **LUMC WORK PROJECTS FOR 2016**

Church members have noticed the piles of dirt and construction barricades blocking the front of the church. The summer work projects have progressed quickly.

We started on a special landscaping project which removed many of the old plantings on both sides of the church. The area is being treated with weed and grub eradication chemicals and will lie fallow until the landscaped walls are installed and much needed sidewalks are poured.

The project involving ComEd, Fail Safe Electric, U. S. Waterproofing, Arris Architects, and AMSCO Engineering has replaced the access piping for the main electrical line to the building. The new line runs under the south driveway and the work has been completed and passed inspection. This work will insure the safety of our electrical system and improve the waterproofing of the lower level.

We still need to install the landscaping wall along the north driveway, install new sidewalks to meet handicap accessibility standards, and resurface and restripe the parking lots and driveways. Hopefully this can be done before late fall.

We are trying to keep costs as low as possible, but we will continue to need the help of the congregation for these projects. Donations to the Maintenance Fund at LUMC will be important and greatly appreciated as we try to keep our church safe and sound.

Special Thanks to Tim Peraino and Steve Weary for supervising the first steps of the major construction project.
