Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"The 2017 Church Budget"

At the Administrative Council meeting on October 26th the church budget for 2017 was edited and approved. A copy of this budget can be found on a table at the rear of the church sanctuary, so feel free to look it over and see what we are planning for next year.

A few highlights might interest you. The General Fund, which pays salaries, utilities, and our principle outreach will increase by only 4%. The maintenance Fund, which provides repairs and improvements for the church and parsonage, insurance, cleaning, and supplies will decrease by 44% due to the heavy spending in 2016. Current bills and future improvement work will be covered the Capital Repair Fund which was built up by member loans. These loans will be repaid over the next few years.

A very important aspect of our spending and next year's budget is our Christian outreach. The major portion of this aspect is our monthly apportionment payment to the United Methodist Conference. This helps to operate the larger aspects of the United Methodist Church, including many local, national, and world-wide outreach programs. The total outreach portion of our 2017 budget will amount to 15% of our total budget! It is our opinion that our church's many outreach programs and mission-related spending is the reason the conference has lowered slightly our apportionment payments for 2017.

Of course the budget does not include the many other Christian outreach programs of our church. One example is the major Open Pantry program through which our church helps to feed the many jobless and hungry families of our region. Another example is the meals we provide each month at the Daybreak Homeless Shelter in Joliet. Keep in mind that both of these programs require the time and effort of many church members to enable them to work

Our church also provides a base of operation for scouting programs and the Happy Hands Preschool. These programs provide an outreach to our local community as is the duty of any Christian church. So in 2017, please consider your continued support of our church, its outreach and its Christian mission in the world.

Books Available in the Library By Kay Norfleet

November 2016 book reviews

The first book is of "Zipporah," donated by Carol Walter. Zipporah was the wife of Moses. It was a mixed marriage, she was from the land of Cush, located in southern Saudi Arabia and he was a Hebrew from Egypt. She was black and he was white. Yet what mattered most was the respect they gave to each other. He showed his care and concern for her and her family after their first meeting at the well. He had fled Egypt because he had angered the Pharoah, and he was new to her land. Yet he remained and asked her father for her hand. Respect! I believe that's the key word. It applies all though out this book, and it ought to apply to how we treat others today. So, thank Carol for giving us this book.

A small book, "PolitiGuide" is one I hope you will pay attention to BEFORE the national election on Nov. 8, and even after if this review doesn't get to you in time. The chapters discuss abortion, capital punishment, the economy, gay marriage, global warming, gun control, healthcare, immigration, national security-all issues that should influence our way of thinking. As has been said, this time our choices will influence God's world. We need to be good disciples. Right? Write or somehow get in touch with your congressmen. YOUR input is crucial. It is your duty as a good citizen to vote.

That's a principle from the Bible and has been repeated by many. But you must be an INFORMED voter. I hope that the material I have covered in the past two months and what you have been exposed to, what God has told you, will give you the prayer power to vote as He wishes. Franklin Graham has suggested, and I strongly agree, that we each take several minutes on the night before the election, Nov. 7, and pray for God's will to be done in the election. He said here's my prayer—that whoever is put into the office of President of the United States of America will know that it was God who put them in that position and that they will have a fear and a reverence for the Lord. Please join me in continuing to pray because this election is the most critical in our lifetime. The next president will be in a position to possibly influence the Supreme Court—for good or for bad—more than any other president in history.

The next book is Nicky (ALPHA speaker) Gumbel. (John Nelson donated the book to the church library.) Nickey writes about all sorts of subjects which the Bible has written about. Homosexuality: Romans 1:32 "homosexual practice goes against God's created order." The Apostle Paul condemns not only those who keep on doing these indecent acts, and those who approve of them. Human sexuality is confirmed by the Bible, but it is qualified. (So, hate the sin, but love the sinner.) Suffering: Man has free will. God gave that to him in the garden. However our suffering is often caused by that free will OR by the free will of others. Suffering is something God uses to draw us closer. He does want only the best for us. Remember that. Illnesses often remind us that no matter how much we pray for healing, they will often endure. But isn't it good that God will use our suffering to give us a better life. Believe! The freaks of nature, hurricanes and floods and such, can be lessened IF man built stronger buildings and retaining walls and used the money God has provided to take care of others-the Golden Rule. The relationship between science and religion. We must not forget the many Christian scientists who gave us the electromagnetic theory, gravity, pasteurization, antiseptic surgery...and the list goes on. Some scientists doubt the Intelligent Design...and God laughs as He proves it again and again.

Several other subjects are pointed out as their relation to the Bible. So interesting!

The last book is "The Promise of Jesse Woods" by Chris Fabry, one of my favorite Christian authors. Matt Plumley's experience of growing up took place in Dogwood, West Virginia. It was, as was all of ours, probably, a time of fun and not-so-fun. Now he lives in the big city, Chicago. A telephone call from a friend in Dogwood gets his attention and he returns to Dogwood.

The Fall Construction season came to a successful conclusion as the west sidewalk was completed, the north walkway and garden walls were re-installed, and the east side garden area was covered with new sod.

This project would not have been successful without the help of many key volunteers. Al Janovyak spent countless hours on his bobcat preparing the earth and moving tons of stone and rock. Some of his equipment received damage that slowed down the effort, but Al's repair skills got them back in working order as soon as possible.

Tom Kehr spent several days constructing the cement forms before the concrete arrived. He then secured the concrete finishers who did a remarkable job after their regular working shifts. The quality of the new west sidewalk is a result of Tom's skill and hard work.

We had several volunteers who spent Saturday Sept. 24 installing the sod on the east side. Don Muggenborg, Tim Peraino, Dale Janssen, Tony Ferrazzi, Mike and Mihash Cheehy, Rob and April Lange, learned how to install sod due to the skillful directions of Al Janovyak.

Dale Janssen spent hours cutting asphalt with a concrete saw and Tim Peraino spent countless hours supervising the Eagle Project installing the new north wall. Mark Hugelman worked alongside the Scouts as the wall began to take shape.

Finally, each of the Trustees took shifts for 2 weeks watering the new sod to make sure it would take root.

Next spring we look forward to completing the sod on the west side, finishing some walls around the church, and helping resurface, restripe, and supervising the resurfacing of both of the parking lots.

We are blessed to have such wonderful volunteers in our church.
