Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Peace of our Lord, Jesus Christ be with you! Since many members of the church have been grieving the loss of the dear beloved members by unexpected death, I am sure that we all are in need of God's comfort, peace, and hope of the eternal life to accept the realities. How can we make sense and have that peace, comfort, and inner strength in the midst of losing loved ones, of the craziness of our world and lives, and of fear, failure, and disappointment? Of course, it is not easy to give answers. Yet, as I seek for them, I think of the season of Lent which gives clues.

Lent is a season of forty days not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 1) and ends on Holy Saturday (April 15). The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, getting away from family, friends, and the familiar routine in order to see God more clearly, enduring the temptation of Satan, and seeking for direction and answers to sort through the major changes happening in his life and ministry. Today, Lent is a time when Christians focus on simple living, repentance, prayer, study, fasting, self-denial, and almsgiving, getting rid of unhealthy habits, and slowing down our busy, fast-paced lifestyles in order to grow closer to God and to focus on what really matters to us. It is also time to challenge ourselves to do something better, healthier, and more nurturing for our relationship with our Creator and with one another.

Now, I would like to offer you some options of spiritual disciplines to use during this year's 40-day Lenten journey. I am convinced that when we become closer to God, we can be at peace no matter what. First of all, **begin every day with devotion to God.** This is the spiritual element that helps us maintain our fear of the Lord, God. Start with prayer and read one chapter or a few verses from the Bible each and every day. Read it three times and listen to the words with your heart. Pray using the message that touches you. You can also use The Upper Room to help with this.

Second of all, **participate in a small group Bible study.** This Lent, our church will offer Lenten Bible study on Making Sense of the Bible: Rediscovering the Power of the Scripture Today by Adam Hamilton. By reading and studying the Bible, you can experience spiritual growth and life-changing renewal. Personally, through small group Bible study, I feel heard, supported, strengthened, and nurtured. So I strongly encourage you to join our Lenten Bible study.

Third of all, **invest your time in relationships.** The more time we spend with various devices (TV, cell phone, iPad, internet, Facebook, etc.), the less time we tend to spend on face to face conversations with those who are dear to us. In life, sometimes things just get in the way of our doing what we know is immensely important. It is very important to spend time with your partner, your children, grandchildren, parents, and friends. We need to practice this discipline intentionally so that we keep the important things first.

Lastly, **eat and exercise for life.** As we all know, our physical condition defines our spiritual well-being. Believe it or not, eating and exercising are spiritual. God wants us to be healthy in body, mind, and spirit. Thus, practice fasting from those foods and activities which keep you from a healthy life is important. We all have boatloads of excuses; yet, let's not allow any excuse, rationalization, or procrastination derail our commitment to whole-life health. Nothing is impossible with God. I am sure that these spiritual practices make us strong and help us move on in the midst of difficulties in our lives. May this year's Lenten experience make a difference in your lives, and in the lives of those you love.

The Last Harvest

A harvest is a gathering of crops when they are ripe. We are acquainted with the harvest of fruits in the spring, more fruits and vegetables in summer and the grains in the fall, along with vegetables like pumpkins and squash. It requires farmland and machinery to plow and plant the land. In the Bible there is a story of a harvest in Matthew chapter 13, a harvest of the Gospel.

Jesus tells His disciples a story of a farmer who plants seed and how different kinds of soil give different results. The soil can be a hard road, gravel, soil with weeds, and good rich soil. Then he explains what these soils represent, which is people with readiness or understanding the Gospel message. There is also coming a harvest of souls at the end of the age, which angels do the gathering (that's why there are so many of them) or harvesting when Christ returns in glory and power. The weeds will be pulled out and put in the trash to be burned and the good crop will be taken up to be with the Lord. **Are you ready for the harvest?**

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"The Many Forms of Stewardship"

When I was younger and first began contributing to my church, I was under the impression that "Stewardship" was just that — contributing money to my church. Now, don't get me wrong, all churches need money to pay for utilities and salaries and to do Christian outreach near and far. But as I have gained experience in our church, I have been made aware of many other forms of stewardship as practiced by our members on a regular basis. The following list of examples is, by no means complete, but I hope it will convince you of the many forms of stewardship at work in our church.

My first example is one that does Christian outreach to those in need in our immediate area. The Open Pantry began years ago at a small cabinet in our church lobby where members would deposit food each Sunday and the pastor would dole out bags of food to those that came to the church. Today, this is a huge endeavor with many helpers, a couple of whom are not even members of our church!

Another example of outreach to those in need is our church's monthly preparation and serving of meals at the Daybreak Homeless Shelter in Joliet. This effort involves the preparation of casseroles and donation of other food by church members followed by the transporting of this food to the shelter and then serving it to the homeless there.

Some years ago it was decided to use members to mow the church lawns instead of paying a company to do it. A riding mower and walk-behind mower were purchased and now three 2-man teams take turns mowing the church lawns.

There are several people that operate fund raisers for our church. Pizza and Potica are two examples of fund raisers that invite us to participate from time to time. Another example are the SCRIP cards which, when used for purchases result in contributions to our church.

Our new audio/visual system requires several operators to get trained and then devote effort on their assigned Sunday to operate the system.

Perhaps the most obvious examples of active stewardship are the members of the church's Board of Trustees. Not only do they plan and sometimes contract the work but most of the many jobs are done by themselves. Laying concrete and planting grass this last summer are outstanding examples.

Books Available in the Library By Kay Norfleet

March 2017 book reviews

"When God Doesn't Make Sense" by Dr. James Dobson. Many of us have waited on God to come to our rescue after we have prayed. Sometimes He doesn't right away. Sometimes he says "no." This book might explain the waiting and the "no" and comfort us. Dr. Dobson reminds us that we can't expect a positive solution always, although we have a loving God. He might have something else in mind. We can't understand because we are only mortals. We simply don't have the capacity to grasp his infinite thinking. Maybe his assessment of the situation will produce results we can't anticipate. Dr. Dobson says that we might wonder "why did she say that?" or Why did he die? Why did that tornado damage so much of the southeastern US. Et al. Those are prayer concerns that God may or may not answer in a timely fashion. But remember He is a loving God who is very much concerned with us and our lives. We just need to TRUST HIM. Didn't He give us life; our world-its inhabitants, the Son, the Sun, etc.

Dr. Dobson stresses our need for FAITH, a synonym for trust, because faith in God symbolizes a determination on our part to believe. His control is for us even though He doesn't always provide proof. Jesus told his disciples that they should anticipate suffering.... "He said I have told you these things (about suffering) so that you might have peace. But take heart! I have overcome the world (John 3:16). Jesus wants us to have peace even through—suffering. He is God who will conquer the suffering. He has a plan for us. (I don't know about you, but it's so much less stressful to pray, do what we can, and then TRUST rather than worry and stress about our circumstances.) Pray for strength to receive whatever answer or non-answer He gives. I believe He will answer that prayer. In addition to this Trust (faith) issue, I recently came across the following: "Jesus blesses faith. There is no doubt about it; faith matters. There is a direct correlation between our faith in God and His responsiveness. He, of course, can do anything, and He is willing to do big things on your behalf. But He is looking for our faith. He is searching for men and women with big vision, because big vision reflects Him, a big God. We serve an omnipotent and omnipresent Lord who asks that we have a giant vision of Him and fuel that vision by great faith-in other words don't put God in a box."

Sometimes, we mope around as if God has lost control and Christianity is hurling into irrelevance. The church has become sterile in some sectors of the world, but where faith is alive the church is on fire. Christ will not contain His blessings where He discovers followers who live by faith. There is a tipping point of truth in their community of faith. Indeed, prayer is prevalent when the faith community believes God for big things (Acts 4:24). God blesses belief. So don't think He doesn't make sense. Dr. Dobson points out our small thinking when we think 'God Doesn't Make Sense.'

Another Carol Walter donation (what would the library be without donations.) "Lilah" by Marek Halter. This is a bit of Historical Fiction about the strong woman who was the sister of Ezra, Lilah. Ezra is the man who led his people back to Jerusalem, the Promised Land with the help of Lilah. Yet, as has happened before, confusion followed because the people did not understand the Lord's big picture. Meanwhile Lilah had not forgotten her true love, a Persian warrior, who wants to make her his wife. Her Love creates conflict.

"David and Goliath." Something for the young is a tab book about David and Goliath. The pictures are colorful, if cartoonish. Maybe this will help young readers realize how much can be gained by reading...or those who don't read yet.

Now for preteen girls is "A Girl's Guide to Making Really Good Choices" (I haven't offered this age anything in a while. Sorry, really.) The guide points out the good and bad choices and how they affect the person making them. For instance, what happens if you choose evil versus good-of course the good has to be in line with what God declares: that is discussed. How must you pray? Is prayer really necessary? So many questions are answered: ie, should I be her friend? How about that math test? The need for PATIENCE is talked about. (I think I need to read the book again.) A DVD "God is NOT Dead" is thought-provoking and something teens and beyond will find interesting. A topic that will, perhaps, encourage them to look further into the subject and be confident in evangelism.


