From the Bishop: A time to declutter?

Few people do "spring cleaning" anymore. In case you've never heard of it, it was the practice of thoroughly cleaning a house in the springtime. Its history is debated but in most cultures, spring was a time of new beginnings which called for the cleaning out of the old.

The origins of spring cleaning are thought to go back to the Iranian Norouz, the Persian New Year, which falls on the first day of spring. Iranians practice

"khooneh tekouni" which literally means "shaking the house" before the New Year begins. Scotland and Japan also have "New Year's cleaning" on December 31.

In northern climates, whether in caves, huts, teepees, sod houses, wooden or brick structures, spring cleaning meant that you had to have enough light and warmth to take draperies and rugs and even mattresses outside in order to clean them. You had to open the windows and the doors to let a fresh breeze blow out the stuffiness and let in more light which is always good for cleaning!

Traditionally the Church had a thorough cleaning of the altar and everything associated with it on Maundy Thursday. Which brings me to my point. Have you looked around your church building lately? Do you have a lot of clutter? Do you have rooms that you don't use much any more and they have become clutter magnets, collecting every old thing brought into or made in the church? Take a look at the backside of the pulpit. Could you do an archeological dig of every children's sermon in the last year (or more)?

Just like Jesus "cleaning the temple," I can tell you stories about cleaning out storage areas in a church only to be met with harsh criticism. "You threw away what?" Whatever it was, we hadn't used it in years. One particular thing that really upset an elderly woman in the church was so faded you could hardly recognize what it was. My husband threw away a raggedy cardboard donkey (who hadn't gotten the lead in a Christmas play or Palm Sunday parade for years) and he got a real dressing down! People don't always like you to mess with their clutter!

But it is all worth it! You see, when we have a lot of clutter around our churches, especially in public spaces for all to see (not just new people or visitors), it says that we live in the past, not in the future. We're hanging onto stuff that we don't need and in fact keeps us from being free, nimble, and even new. Our old stuff is more important than dreaming and creating fresh expressions of being church, telling the story, and living unencumbered by all the old.

De-cluttering our buildings from literal papers, props and stuff may actually help us de-clutter some other things like old hurts, "we've always done it that way" excuses, and too much looking back and inward instead of looking forward and outward. We could all really use some spring cleaning in our hearts, minds, and relationships!

There's a meme on Facebook that says: "Instead of giving up sweets for Lent, give up clutter! Each day fill a bag (any size) with things that you no longer need/use and donate to charity." It might be a little late to do the full Lenten practice but even if you just do it for a few weeks or Holy Week—at church and in your own life—you might find the de-cluttering of your house, church, heart and soul. God is always seeking to do a new thing in us and through us. Give God some space to work, open the windows and doors of your life for fresh breezes and more light, beginning in your building and moving into your heart and mind.

Enough for now, I've got some de-cluttering to do. What about you?



Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"The Seasons of Stewardship" (The following was adapted from an article I read)

The response to Christian stewardship is not a static thing. Like the seasons of the year, stewardship has its own seasons during our lives. As young children we respond by practicing self-control and obedience, saving that shiny quarter we receive from our parent to put in the Sunday offering plate.

As older children we may learn to give a portion of our allowance to the Church. Or, we may engage in creative fundraising enterprises to raise money for a cause if we are moved to respond to the misfortune of others.

As teenagers we feel at a loss over how to be Christian stewards. We become victims of our culture's incessant message of material consumerism.

As young adults we enter a season of accumulation. We acquire education, "stuff," fashionable clothes, new and different friends, and we hope, marketable skills that will ensure a comfortable living. Regrettably, not many of us learn yet the difference between making a good living and making a good life.

As middle-aged adults we enter the season of generatively. We begin to learn how to give our stuff away. We strive to de-clutter our lives, we clean out the closets and put on yard sales. We strive to simplify our lives having learned that as it turns out, the stuff we own, owns us. In the tension of the limitation of means, we may learn to invest in the next generations, planting trees we will never see to full growth, but upon which our children and our children's children will swing or enjoy their fruit. And that is meaningful and satisfying in ways we never knew before.

Book Reviews for April 2017

"God's Promises for the American Patriot." The book is a reminder of Who is really in control. The verse in Romans 13: 1, 7 "Let every soul be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are appointed by God... Render therefore to all their due: taxes...fear...honor." Hmm, that gives us pause. I wonder how God would lead this nation IF that was done. President George H. Bush prayed "...there is but one use of power, that is to serve ('ALL'-my word) the people. Help us to remember that." In the promises to the "American Patriot," words of rebuke and encouragement are included by people such as God's co-workers: George Washington Carver, Abraham Lincoln, Dwight Eisenhower, Martin Luther King, Ruth and Billy Graham, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John etc. etc.

With Love, Wherever You Are- a historical non-fiction story of perseverance

War is TERRIBLE. I think most of us will agree to that. The physical atrocities: blindness (physical and mental), lost limbs, loss of life. Just being an immediate part of that, the doctors and nurses and any onlookers, must have been shocked and numbed because the fact is that those cruelties took place every day. Man's inhumanity to man. Also don't forget the loss of ANY creature comforts, poor food, poor accommodations plus danger from surroundings enemy planes, enemies with guns or grenades or knives. Who wouldn't be deeply affected by this scenario? What would these awful situations do to anyone's thinking? By coincidence? (I don't believe in coincidences instead a plan from On High) Helen and Frank: nurse and doctor met and went to war. Helen and Frank had each other. They had their love, which admittedly suffered a few bumps on the road to a lasting marriage. Not only bumps, but deep potholes. However, their love smoothed over the depressions and won. They did not let the war win over them, they won the war for themselves. They were married for 51 years! Really!

"The Lost Gospel of Barabbas" is another historical non-fiction book. Barabbas was a man with a vision. That vision of black ravens warned him of impending danger. However he was able to avoid the birds because he was brought up by caring people who taught and gave him wisdom: wisdom and teachings he would put to good use in living a life which was blessed After his wife's murder and his revenge he encountered the black ravens again. Yet the grace of God reigned.

"The Easter Story"- a NON-FICTION picture book for young people. The story is of the resurrection, it does not mention WHY Christ died. Or WHY we honor Him. But it's a start. Perhaps adults could continue on and emphasize that part.

Lastly, I offer a book "Did Jesus Really Say That? The author offers interpretation of Christ's words, which are often overlooked. Some insight into the mind of our Lord is given. Each chapter is to be studied deeply, maybe your ideas will agree, maybe not. Pray about that. And remember who Jesus is.




Donation at the Ladies Tea

Let's be very generous to the creatures that grace God's world!


