As we look around, we easily see our corn fields, gardens, and even trees on the streets are growing and, especially, Acacia trees are blooming beautifully with the fragrance. My vegetable garden is providing us fresh onion leeks, radish leaves, and spinach. It is obviously a season of growing. As the Easter season is ended and Pentecost Sunday is approaching, it would be good to remind you of the Holy Spirit who makes us grow in loving God and serving others. In understanding the work of the Holy Spirit, it is our tendency to think that it is the Holy Spirit's job to make us feel better. Of course, the Spirit as Comforter eases our distress, encourages us, and comes to us in times of trouble to remind us of Jesus' presence and promises. Yet, in the Pentecost story in Acts, the Holy Spirit descended like tongues of flame and like a violent wind and prompted the disciples to make disruptive, disturbing, and life changing work through the power of God. Everyone who witnessed the disciples' multi-lingual ability was bewildered, amazed, and astonished.

According to a commentary, the word which was translated as Comforter and Advocate in John 15 is *Paraclete*, which is a compound Greek word that means "to come alongside another." Based on this translation, the work of the Holy Spirit is to come alongside us to encourage and equip us for the task of ministry. The Spirit stirs and shakes things up to come alongside us to share the life-giving word of grace of God for all people. In this understanding, it is not only the pastor's job to teach, preach, share faith, pray, give witness and visit the sick, but it is also your call by God's Spirit to come along side another to do the same.

We all have been joined by our baptism into the community of faith to encourage, equip, and testify the Word of God for the work of love, peace, and justice. If we, the church, ignore the work of the Holy Spirit individually or communally, we cannot grow and bear fruits. Moreover, we become dangerous because we will lose our direction, hope, and purpose for our future. Jesus sent us the Holy Spirit to continue the ministry of Him: fellowship, praying, discerning, correcting, taking care of the needy and feeding the hungry, evangelizing to everyone, encouraging, equipping, and testifying the truth of God. Only the Holy Spirit enables us to continue these ministries and missions; grow and bear fruits; make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Let us continue the ministry of Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit in and through our daily lives and our church ministries and missions.

VBS is one of the most important parts of our ministries and missions to the children and youth in our community and beyond. We are going to **have VBS 2017**, **"Maker Fun Factory," from June 12 to 16, 2017**. Over 100 children with 60 youth and 30 adults volunteers are involved in this event. There are items needed. Please support VBS through your prayers, presence, gifts, and service. As we plant and sow seeds of the gospel in the hearts of the children and youth, they will grow and bear fruits in the future and make our world better place. Come join the ministry of the kingdom of God. May the Holy Spirit make you grow in loving God and serving others.


Sanctuary Volunteers Are Needed!

Greatest Contentment By Richard H. Lee

Do you know what it means to be content with what you have? Other terms like this are having enough or satisfied. And there are many things we can be content with or find adequate but others that continue to bother us. In the Bible Paul teaches the churches about being content, especially in the letter to the Philippians chapter 4. Jesus also teaches about being content and not seeking riches or many possessions in the Sermon on the Mount and the parables such as the Rich Man in Matthew 19, Mark 10 and Luke 18: 18-30.

I think it is very surprising that Jesus tells the rich man, "If you want to be perfect, go and sell all you have and give the money to the poor" and then the man went away sad but unwilling to be generous (Good News Bible). What would happen if this message was preached in our churches today? Doing a word search with the Internet resource Bible Gateway.com we find Paul explaining how much trouble and persecutions he has experienced in Second Corinthians 12:10 and yet he didn't give up or go into hiding.

In the letter to the Philippians Paul explains how we should be joyful and rejoicing in the Lord in 4:4. Then he says to have good thoughts and dwell on peace in 4:8-9 so this is a mental attitude. Being satisfied economically is hard but has many benefits as he explains in 4:11 and 18. Last he explains how we should be satisfied with what we have, whether full or hungry in verse 12 and how God will supply all our needs in verse 19. Maybe Paul has already accomplished most of what he has been chosen for. The love of money can completely corrupt a man to the point of making secret deals and secret bank accounts with many lawyers and accountants to keep it safe and hidden.

Refusing someone who asks you for help will mess up your prayer requests in Matthew 6:2-4, 7:36-38, and 10:42 (giving a drink of pure water to one of my followers).

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"The Capital Repair Fund"

During 2016 the church had several repairs and improvements made. These expenses were initially paid for out of the Maintenance Fund but it soon became clear that additional funds would be needed. For this reason the Capital Repair Fund was re-started. This fund was initially started a few years ago to pay for the security, office, Open Pantry, and kitchen improvements that were under way.

The funds for these Capital Repair Fund start-ups were both paid by loans from church members and from our Endowment Fund. So, in July of 2016 loans were made from church members and the Endowment Fund in the total amount of \$75,000. Of this total \$55,000 were from church members. All of these loans were to be repaid as the church became capable and were paid an interest rate of 1.5% per year.

Since the total contributions to the Capital Repair Fund have reached about \$16,000 we will be making some loan repayments this month. In fact one of the smaller loans will be retired. Repayment to the Endowment Fund will be delayed until all of the member loans are paid off.

Unfortunately these contributions have been less than desired and pay-back of the loans will be slower than expected. In addition the trustees are planning on some additional church improvements that will involve some serious expenses. For these reasons, the Finance Committee encourages you to increase (or start) your giving to the Capital Repair Fund.

Our offering envelopes do not now include a line for the Capital Repair Fund and so the "blank line" has to be used. You can enter "Capital Repair Fund" on this line or simply write **CRF** instead. Thank you to those members who made loans to the church and thank all of you for your help and repaying the loans!

(Betty's husband, Tshala, was also a missionary supported form our Conference. He died in a bus accident in 2014 while returning from the market.) June 2017 Book Reviews

Non-fiction for the men, "Wise Guys" by Kent Evans. The cover of the book asks are you open to "unlocking hidden wisdom from the men around you." Seems to me you first have to admit to yourself that you need wisdom. Also seems to me that we all need wisdom and that we should follow the principles in this book. However, it's for guys. The author believes strongly that men who admit to needing help can learn from each other. He wants men to be open to more male friendships, to seek out certain friendships. It used to be that men learned by observing and ASKING. Now it's more that each man has to be self-made, self-reliant. BUT didn't Jesus himself seek out others? The chapters range in topics from Figuring Yourself out to Ditching the Cynicism to Excelling with lots in between. Where do you find these geniuses? Well, actually you're probably one. Also, do you know someone who has traits you'd like? Wouldn't it be great to have a list of men who have a specific expertise or behavior? For instance: the personality traits of correcting gently, knowing when to let go, welcoming kindly, always be asking, having certain skills, are chapters unto themselves-maybe one or two apply.

Can you confidently defend your faith? When friends or anyone asks you to prove the existence of God, what comes to mind? Or, more importantly, what comes out of your mouth? Do you mumble through a half-hearted explanation, or can you make a coherent case for your faith? Consider this: Thomas Aquinas often referred to as the greatest theologian of the Middle Ages, developed his five arguments for God's existence. These arguments are grounded in an Aristotelian ontology and make use of the infinite regression argument. Aquinas did not intend to fully prove the existence of God as he is orthodoxly conceived (with all of his traditional attributes) but proposed his Five Ways as a first stage, which he built upon later in his work. Aquinas' Five Ways argued from the unmoved mover, first cause, necessary being, argument from degree, and the teleological argument. The unmoved mover argument asserts that from our experience of motion in the universe (motion being the transition from potentiality to actuality) we can see that there must have been an initial mover. Aquinas argued that whatever is in motion must be put in motion by another thing, so there must be an unmoved mover. Aquinas' argument from first cause started with the premise that it is impossible for a being to cause itself (because it would have to exist before it caused itself) and that it is impossible for there to be an infinite chain of causes, which would result in an infinite regress. Therefore, there must be a first cause, itself uncaused. The argument from necessary being asserts that all beings are contingent, meaning that it is possible for them not to exist. Aquinas argued that if everything can possibly not exist, there must have been a time when nothing existed; as things exist now, there must exist a being with necessary existence, regarded as God. Aquinas argued from degree, considering the occurrence of degrees of goodness. He believed that things which are called good must be called good in relation to a standard of good. There must be a maximum goodness that which causes all goodness. The teleological argument asserts the view that things without intelligence are ordered towards a purpose. Aquinas argued that unintelligent objects cannot be ordered unless they are done so by an intelligent being, which means that there must be an intelligent being to move objects to their ends: God Seems to me that Aquinas was spot on. Not only was there a Creator, God, but He is a loving and Caring God. If He made so many things for us and us, how can He not be? There must be an intelligent being, a creator, for our creation thus we who have fallen are unintelligent beings dependent on that intelligent being for everything in our world, even the ones who don't believe. But we are bound to help others see. Greg Laurie's book "Tell Someone-You Can Share the Good News" shows and encourages, (remember Christ told us) to share (go and preach) the Good News. Then perhaps one of the twenty-five percent who don't go to church will go, and learn. How has what He has done for you affected your being?

The book "Noah-a Man of Destiny." is a historical work of fiction. Noah was a man who stood up to the non-believers by doing what God prescribed withstanding the unbelief and ridicule of the evil world at that time. I wonder at the faith of someone who kept on doing what he knew was right. What strength of character he had. The book of Genesis told the story of Noah and the flood, now this book presents the author's description of the pre-flood. A repeat review of "Walkin' with God Ain't for Wimps." This is a compilation of short, very short, anecdotes which might divulge insights our characters. For instance: The story about what happens when we think we're going to pray explains how often we are not focused enough to avoid other thoughts to intrude. Or, have you ever lost your wallet or thought you did. Or, and this applies to all of us, I think who covet. God wants us to reflect on his freebies. Or, for animal lovers: Butterball. Each story is followed by a short prayer appropriate to the incident.

And for the kids, "Jesus Wants All of Me". A bedtime prayer edition. Each prayer is preceded by a short story describing some event that might be appropriate to the child at that time. Please take and enjoy the book(s), but then return them so others might enjoy.

LUMC WORK PROJECTS FOR SUMMER 2017

With the arrival of spring weather it is a good time to note the number of projects which the Board of Trustees has scheduled for the near future. At times our work list has looked endless, but through hard work the Trustees have narrowed the list down to a few critical items.

We are once again thankful that a group of volunteers is helping cut the grass around the church on a weekly basis. The group is looking for volunteers who can drive a riding mower or volunteers who can use a lawnmower to trim around the edges and places the mowers can't go. We currently have 3 teams rotating so it would only be a few times each cutting season. Please forward your name to the church office if you are interested.

A project to refinish the parking lots has begun. Recently the large cracks were resealed; the next step will be to resurface and restripe the parking lots and driveways. This project will begin the week after Memorial Day. Parts of the lots will be off limits as the surfaces and lines have time to dry, but all should be complete for weekend services.

We are trying to keep costs as low as possible, but we will need the help of the congregation for these coming projects. Donations for the coming projects at LUMC will be important and greatly appreciated as we try to keep our church safe and sound.

Our final project will involve assessing possibilities for improving the handicap accessibility of our church, and repairing or replacing the roof. As everyone is aware we have significant needs to make both levels of our church available for anyone to use for worship and programs. To being the process we have interviewed architectural teams and selected Arris Architects. The long term project has begun with the Trustees evaluating preliminary plans. We will soon be looking for input from all congregation members as the process goes into full planning.

Special Thanks to our hard working group who quietly give so much time and effort to our church and never charge for overtime or hazardous duty: Tony Ferrazzi and Tim Peraino have done several internal repairs. Jana Stelter, Al Janovyak, Tom Kehr, and Dale Janssen spent a recent long Saturday pouring cement for the new sculpture in the north garden, trimming dead trees, and repairing broken walls. We are truly blessed to have willing workers with strong backs.
