I hope that you have enjoyed the beautiful summer days with over 90 degrees in fall. A few weeks ago, I visited Silver Cross Hospital around 7:00 am due to be with one of our church leaders who scheduled to have a surgery. When I got there, I found out that the time had been postponed to 11 am that day. So I went to the hospital cafeteria to have a breakfast. They have really freshly cooked good food with very reasonable prices. After gathering some food and a cup of soup, I went to the cashier to pay. Then, I found out that I forgot to bring my wallet. I was embarrassed because there were people behind me lined up ready to have their breakfast. While I did not know what to do, I remembered that I put my credit card on my cell phone. I asked the cashier whether they have E-pay system. The guy behind me who seemed like a staff of the hospital, said, "We do not have that system yet." And he said, "I will pay for your breakfast. I was speechless and I expressed how thankful I am." With embarrassment and full of overwhelming gratitude, I finally sat down and looked around to find him, but he was gone.

After getting my wallet at home, I came back to the hospital again with a thanks card and looked for him. I only remembered his first name, Mark and the first letter of his last name, B. After hearing my story, the volunteer at the information desk told me that there are 700 workers in the hospital and there are many whose names are Mark with last name B, so she cannot find him. She said, "Instead of finding him, do unto others." Mark B made my day and I was overwhelmingly blessed by his gracious and generous act of kindness and saw God in and through him, realizing that there are a lot of God-filled people in the world. The memory will stay in my heart for a long time.

As we look around, on the one hand, we see our world is suffering by Hurricanes, earthquakes, wildfires, White supremacy, racism, hatred, fear of the other, the ending of DACA, travel bans, shootings, terrorism, division, threat of nuclear weapon, and the tension in the Korean Peninsula. To name a few. What happens in the world makes us sick and tired, vulnerable and hopeless. On the other hand, there are beautiful and inspiring stories of those who helped the Hurricane victims. For examples, a furniture store used its beds for shelter, Anheuser-Busch sent 155,000 cans of water, civilians rescued many people with boats, Coldplay wrote a sentimental song for Houston, a doughnut shop kept its doors open, people came together to help total strangers in need. Our church, Lemont UMC, also has raised over \$2,000 for UMCOR disaster relief in the past month and fed those who are in need through the Open Pantry, Day Break Shelter, supporting Hungry Huskies in NIU, and beyond and above.

God is surely at work in the midst of the human suffering with His grace, mercy, comfort, and love and is calling us to continue to do the same with gracious, generous, and inclusive hearts. Because of God who is working in and through His people just like you and I, the world would look a lot like the kingdom of heaven. Dear the people of God, in October, Lemont UMC will start Confirmation Class for 7th and 8th graders, celebrate the ministries and missions at Church Conference on October 4th at 7 pm., serve the Day Break Shelter with casseroles Sr. High Youth are going to make, administer the sacrament of Baptism for Leon Randall (10/8) and Andrew Polodna (10/22), have UMMen (10/11) and Primetimers (10/21) gatherings, Bonfire at Dale Janssen's house (10/20), and Murder Mystery Dinner (11/4), and continue to raise mission offerings for the Hurricane victims. Please support all the ministries and missions we are called through your prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness so that we can continue to make space for the life of another to be God-filled and together make our world better place.

May God bless you and give authority and power to serve His kingdom.

Currently we have just under \$1K of "extra" cards on hand that are just sitting in our office. After about 2 years of trying this method of keeping 'extra' cards on hand for convenience sake, I find that it is necessary to try another method.

Effective August 1st I will be taking orders throughout the month, and placing one (1) order each month. The date I will be Placing these orders will be the Last Monday of Each month. That gives everyone 4 Sundays to communicate with me. If there is no interest, well then of course I will not be placing an order.

Hero of Harvey By Richard H. Lee, USA Today

A stranger drove down Houston streets in a big used military vehicle with a cab five feet high looking for residents to rescue. Nick Sissa drove through heavy rain and high water rescuing about 300 people and taking them to Fire department or other emergency personnel. He had a good job managing construction contracts but he had no work because of the flooding.

So he put his truck to the best use with 55 gallons of diesel fuel and went out looking for people trapped in their homes, some needing medical attention. He even rescued two firefighters whose truck was stranded and dozens of people from the local Westbury Methodist Church in Meyerland TX. Those people were seeking safety. He said even in water chest-high, the vehicle was stable. It was named by the emergency managers, "Bama 1" since Nick was from Alabama and now many people recognize that big truck in local neighborhoods.

Obviously such trucks should continue to be built and maybe stockpile for emergencies like this. Another danger in the Texas area is toxic materials pollution of standing water and people will have to avoid wading or living in such polluted water. There are many toxic waste sites, especially around Houston where petrochemical sites have dumped toxic waste that has never been cleaned up because of limited funds.

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

"The Changing Seasons"

One thing that the Finance Committee can always count on is the changing of giving with the seasons. As we go away on vacations during the summer and delay our giving until we return, the summer months see a reduction in giving and a lowering of our balances. There is a recovery in the fall and winter and of course December see generous giving when you count Christmas.

Last year's Christmas giving was outstanding with over \$30,000 of extra giving in December and over \$5,000 for Christmas alone! This enabled us to start 2017 with a beginning balance in the General Fund of almost \$33,000! We were then able to keep the General Fund in a positive balance all your – almost a first for us.

In the next week or so a budget will be developed for next year. It will include any wage increases, a change of our monthly Conference Apportionment payments, and estimates as to utility costs. Several other changes are often made as church programs come and go.

In a few weeks I will begin to send out letters asking you to consider increasing your giving next year and to make pledge for that giving. It is my hope that you will read and seriously consider these letters as we work our way to Pledge Sunday.

October 2017 Book Reviews

Mary Ende gave the library a book on "Sweet Tomorrows." It's easy reading. The main character has bought a B "Numbered Days" & B, Rose Harbour in partial response to her suffering. (She needed an outlet-a place where she could grieve.) But much to her surprise, she is sent a myriad of people who are also grieving. And she in her new B & B is able to empathize, perhaps it's the place, but whatever she helps each and they in turn help each other. Suffering is allowed by God so that He can make us see a new plan for our lives, to build stronger character, if only we can learn to lean on Him...He loves us so much. There are a lot of people in our congregation and the world outside who are suffering, let's empathize, recognize, and like the main character DO SOMETHING to help or just be there.

John Nelson donated a book on "Searching Issues." Issues such as God and suffering, other religions, sex before marriage, science and Christianity, and the Trinity. Yes, the answers the author gives always come from the Bible. But isn't that our moral compass? Our bulwark? Our foundation...a last point of reference? Ask through prayer, read the Bible. It is God-breathed. Seems to me that these "Searching Issues" are important enough topics for us to consider.

Then "WWJD." Examples of questions which might appear in real life, for example, about compassion, "The Little Drummer Boy." Or "Numbered Days" will give you an insight. Or "Miss Astor," generosity. Don't you think we should be prepared with Biblical answers.

Why don't you make up your own questions, then check if your responses are Biblical. Now that's a good exercise for all of us.

Two books for the little ones. One, "The Itsy-Bitsy Spider" a board book. Babies will enjoy the colorful pictures. The ones reading might even sing that tune. Also, "7 Days of Awesome." A creation story told in rhyme with eye-catching illustrations.

Because You're Tired Today...

Do you feel woozy?

There's a specific kind of motion sickness afflicting you and me, but it's not the kind that happens when we're jostled wildly on a theme park ride or trapped in the backseat on a twisting mountain road trip or stuck in the front row of an IMAX Michael Bay marathon. This particular illness is an addiction to movement; a relentless fixation on activity, a persistent compulsion to feel as though we are productive. It is the perpetual drive to more and greater and faster and better that propels us through the furious blur of our everyday—and causes us to miss a good deal of it. We run and sweat and strive and chase our seconds away, always arriving at any given spot breathless, frazzled, and eyeing the next spot off somewhere in the distance we think we need to sprint toward. Most of us have spent so much time in this hyper-urgency that we've forgotten that this is not normal, that it isn't supposed to be like this. Our speed is literally making us sick and yet we adore it, we aspire to it, we worship it like an ever-distant God who would deign to bless us if only our velocity could increase slightly and we could do and be enough to deserve it. We run through our days, not with the lightness of one who has joy simply in running, but as one desperate to catch something they believe will give them life. This frantic pace is not deserving of our allegiance. It is not worthy of our devotion. It is a manmade devil; a cruel dealer stringing along an addled adrenaline junky with the prevailing promise of a fulfillment that never comes, leaving us forever chasing a high that is always just beyond reach. And so, we live wearily. And so, our bodies and souls are exhausted. You my friend, are tired. And because you're tired you need to give yourself a priceless gift: You need to give yourself permission to stop; to consent to a stilling that will bring rest and peace and save you from drowning in the stirring sea of your own making. It's difficult I know, because we both live within this twisted equation; that activity equals productivity, and productivity equals our value—and that values merits us love. Our motion then becomes a barometer for our worth, and so we rarely slow ourselves for fear that we will lose something, when in reality it is in our very inability to pause and breathe, that we lose. We lose our awareness in the moment, the fleeting sacredness of here. We lose the sweet gift of being fully present in that now moment that is so very difficult to grasp. We lose our availability to those right in front of us who need us to see them well. We lose our very lives, second by squandered second. Our soul fatigue is not something we need to be resigned to. It is not a forgone conclusion that we succumb to this motion sickness, but we must be willing to set down our need to be defined by our achievements and our accomplished tasks, by the to-do lists we plow through or the kudos we secure. We have to reclaim our beloved-ness which is not tied to our resumes or checklists or velocity, but to our very breath and being. Because you're tired, stop running. Because you're tired, slow down. Because you're tired, breathe. Because you're tired, rest. Because you are tired, do nothing and trust that this is enough.

You are already worth it.


Turn your own reluctance into boldness as you examine the significant challenges facing Moses and how God shaped his character and life in powerful ways.
