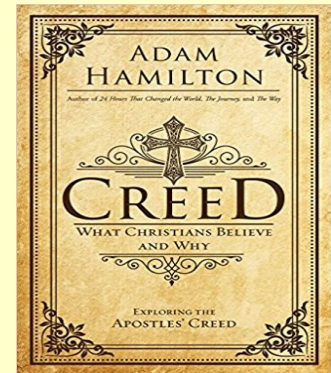


Lenten Bible Study

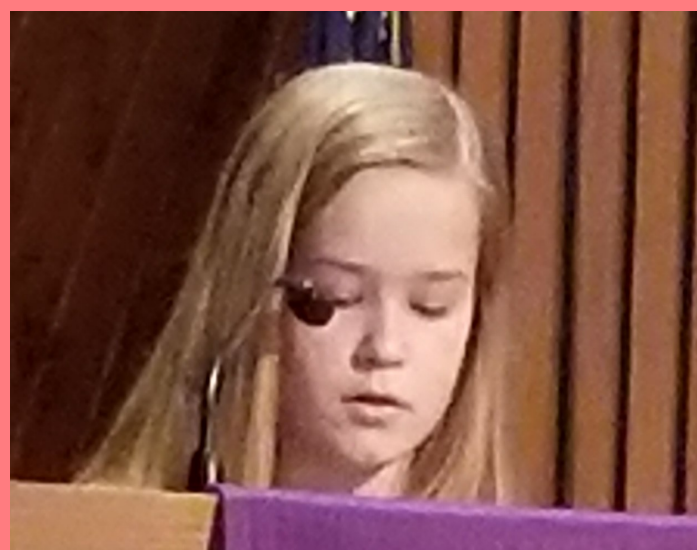
Junior Choir and Children in Worship

Dearest Family and Friends,

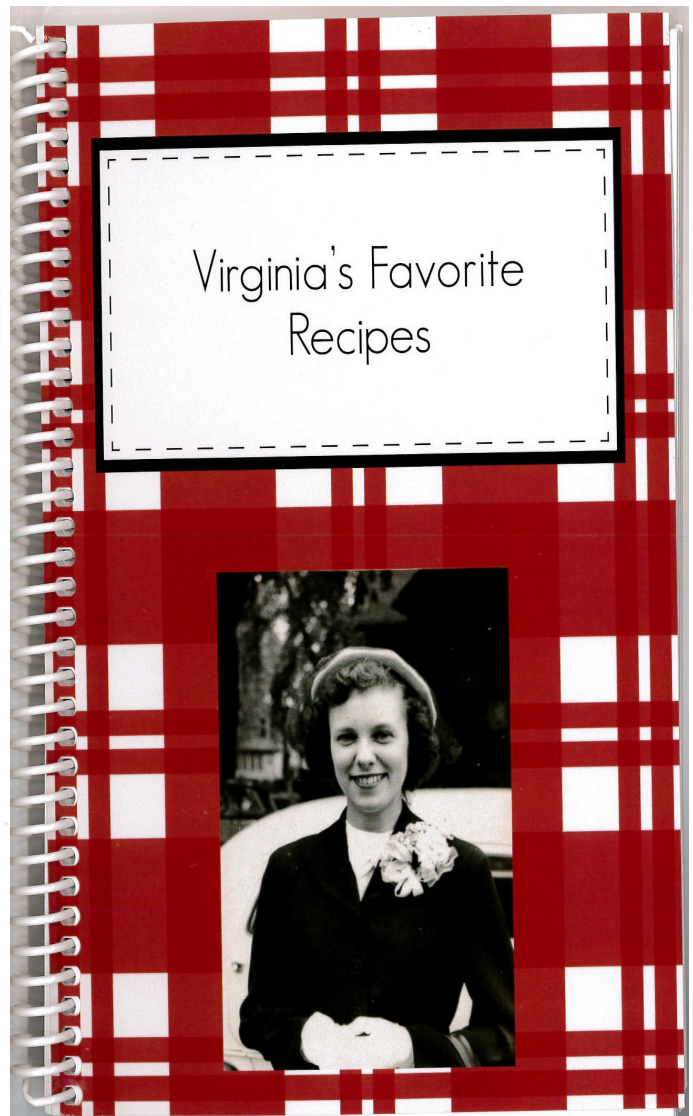

Righteousness and Luther

By Richard H. Lee

Martin Luther at first thought "the righteousness of God" which Paul mentioned in Romans 3:21 was the righteousness God required of us in perfectly fulfilling his law. Because Luther realized more and more he could not possibly measure up to that impossible demand, he grew increasingly angry with God. At one time he had exclaimed, "love God? I hate him." Eventually he came to realize that the righteousness of God was that which God provided for us. "Thereupon I felt myself reborn and to have gone through open doors into paradise."

This righteousness from God, then, is nothing less than the perfect righteousness of Jesus Christ, who, through his sinless life and his death in obedience to the Father's will, perfectly fulfilled the law of God in both its precepts and its penalty. In other words, this righteousness that God both requires and provides embraces all the work of Christ—how he perfectly obeyed God's law, satisfied God's justice and redeemed us from God's curse. But we have to accept this.

Books Available in the Library By Kay Norfleet

March 2018 book reviews

"Freedom's Children: Young Civil Rights Activists tell their own stories"

"People are people, even though they're not always good people." That was what a young Mississippi black man was taught by his wise grandmother. That statement was made around the middle of the 20th century, around the time when the focus was on civil rights in the South. Hopefully more true at that time than now. A black grandmother was speaking to her grandson about a white person. Maybe that same sentiment was relayed by Whites. Unfortunately the majority of Whites enforced the most disagreeable of laws—for instance; Blacks had to ride in the back of the bus, no matter what, for example, if a Black older person were sitting somewhere near the back of the bus, and a white child boarded, most likely the white bus driver would demand that the Black get up and move (and what if there were no seats in back) to the back of the bus, and there was no room the bus driver ordered him to get up so the white child could have his seat. If the Black did not get up, well then the police would be called. (Being arrested for such an offense, any offense, could prove devastating.) Being Black meant you had your own special places. However, most of the time those places were not sanitary or easy to get to or SAFE. Blacks had to enter through special entrances to movie theaters, then they were directed to sit ONLY in places that didn't allow them to see movie too well, Blacks had their own restrooms and water fountains, none of which received cleaning on a regular basis, certainly they could not attend classes with Whites, (Black schools were poorly funded) there were churches for the different races (I never knew what they taught -not equality, certainly), and if a particular Black annoyed a White too much, he might be hanged or his house bombed, and on and on. (Talk about "walking on eggs.") In the middle of the last century, tensions rose mainly because the Blacks had had enough. The book addresses what the younger Blacks saw and revolted against. Perhaps Isaiah 10:2 "Doom to those who pronounce wicked decrees, and keep writing harmful laws to deprive the needy of their rights and to rob the poor among us of justice..." spurred them on. I really don't know the answer, the book's stories certainly show that they had had ENOUGH!

Another "Chicken Soup" book, but this time "Teens talk about Middle School!" The stories are SHORT, designed to address YOUR problems or the ones you think you have- (come on, admit it, there might be one or two subjects that interest you: for example, tough times, friendship, how your experiences matter, being happy with yourself, grades, young love....just getting along with others.)

Some of the stories are: "Defining Moments"-The friendship that developed because of science. "The Donkey Belly.-The bullying comeback. OR We all have a 'fixed time' on the planet and need, really need, to make the best of it- "More than Good Enough" relates a truth from a wise middle schooler about focus.

"Wise Guys" This isn't a book about the questionable sorts of men who might pull off evil deeds. This is a book about a man, yes it's one opinion, who offers advice on how much men need mentoring. Admit it. The author is the result of a couple who divorced. As is pretty usual, he stayed with his mother. Yet he needed the advice of other men to live a fuller life. He writes about 16 men who offered pieces of wisdom to him. He was able to focus and assimilate what character traits were important. What is important to you? The author's advice to you is to find a man (men) whose accomplishments represent the character traits you'd like to have, then ask him (them) and listen. Maybe you'll become a mentor because someone wants to know what you know.

We, even women, know that we don't know everything. Humility is the name of the game. Romans:3, 23-we've all fallen short of God's glory. The least we can do is to try and improve.

A book for kids, colorful illustrations and wise words: "WOW: the good news in four words" Those four words are: Wow! Uh-Oh. Yes! Ahh. Now how do they apply to God's creation? Creation, Adam and Eve, Christ-He's your best friend, God's gift. Suggestion: Adults read the book once to a little one-pausing after each Wow! Uh-oh, Yes! Ahh. Then read it again and have little one help you make sounds. I bet you'll be asked to read it a third time (maybe a fourth).
