Special Session of General Conference wrap up

From Northern Illinois Conference

ST. LOUIS – After four days of prayers, debates, and voting, delegates at the Special Session to General Conference, the United Methodist Church's top lawmaking assembly, approved the Traditional Plan that affirms church policies on homosexuality and strengthens enforcement. The vote was 438 to 384.

The Council of Bishops' recommended One Church Plan, which would have left questions of marriage up to individual churches and clergy, and ordination up to conferences failed in the Legislative Committee on Feb. 25. The vote was 53 to almost 47 percent.

More than 820 clergy and lay delegates from all over the world met from Feb. 24-26 in St. Louis to discuss and act on the report of the Commission on a Way

Forward, over the issue of human sexuality. Late in the afternoon on Feb. 26, the delegates approved a motion to ask the Judicial Council, the highest court in the denomination, to review the constitutionality of the approved legislation. The Judicial Council will address the request at its next scheduled meeting April 23-25 in Evanston, III

Near the end of the day, delegates voted to adopt the minority report for one of the petitions on disaffiliation, which then passed. When the Traditional Plan vote was announced and flashed on the screen, some in the room erupted with observers singing "Blessed Assurance." A group of delegates gathered in a circle and joined in with the singing. LGTBQ supporters in the bleachers went into a call and response, some chanting, "no, no, no", in protest of the vote.

A handful of observers unhappy with the day's legislative results tried to gain entrance to the plenary floor, but security officers blocked them and eventually moved them through turnstiles farther away from the doors. The protesters continued to chant their demand to be admitted. "I'm going back and forth between being heartbroken and crying to total disbelief," said NIC Delegation Chair Elisa Gatz. "It seems so surreal. It seems like we were there talking about something completely different. That wasn't what we were called to do and that isn't how you treat people."

NIC Clergy delegate Rev. Gregory Gross, who is an openly gay deacon, expressed pain and grief over the General Conference's decision. "What's going through my mind

is that people made it very clear they don't want me in their church," said Gross who added it may be time to talk about a new expression of Methodism. "What happened this week is not the grace of the United Methodist Church and it's not the grace that John Wesley taught us. We need to find a place where we can really live that out."

Aurora District Superintendent Rev. Jeffry Bross and his 81-year-old father Rev. Bill Bross, a retired United Methodist clergy from the Wisconsin Conference, were among the 3,000 observers at this historic Special Session. The father-son pair offered prayers to all those who may be hurting from the decisions made. "To the LGBTQI community, know that your sacred worth is not affected by the votes of people, hear that

strongly," said Bross. "God's love is bigger than this General Confer-

ence."

The Rev. Billy Bross, who first preached from the pulpit at age 18, expressed his disappointment in the decisions of this General Conference. "It feels like we are going backward rather than forward and I always want the church to go forward," said Bross who added he also remains hopeful. "We will always be people of God and we will find a way to make it work. We may not make it together with all the people we've been marching with together, but somehow or another, there will be a continuation of who we are and what we stand for." At the end of a brief closing worship, Council of Bishops President Kenneth H. Carter wished everyone in attendance "the peace of the Lord in the midst of all you have experienced." Bishop Carter later said that bishops will have to do a lot of outreach after this Gen-

eral Conference, especially to progressives who feel hurt by what transpired.

"We are going to do a lot of outreach to progressives to say 'we see you'," he said during a press conference after General Conference adjourned. Carter is also the leader of the Florida Conference, which has congregations across the theological spectrum. The General Conference is the highest legislative body in the church and the only group who can decide church law and speak officially for the global denomination. "What do we do the day after? First, we grieve. Then we go and make disciples of Jesus Christ," wrote Bishop Sally Dyck on Facebook on Feb. 27. "Making disciples means becoming incarnate love and grace to each other and our communities." The Bishop will release her post-General Conference statement on Friday, March 1. It will be posted on the NIC website and sent in a special eNews.

What is the Traditional Plan?

The Traditional Plan keeps the current language around sexuality and increases accountability by streamlining the processes to enforce penalties for violations of The Book of Discipline related to marriage and ordination of LGBTQI persons. Some parts of the Traditional Plan were ruled unconstitutional, and it will take some time to clarify which parts will become part of our church law and which parts will not. "We continue to teach and believe that all persons are welcomed in the church, all persons are persons of sacred worth and we welcome all to receive the ministry of Jesus. Human sexuality is a topic on which people of faith have differing views," said Bishop Ken Carter, president of the Council of Bishops, after the conference ended. "Despite our differences, we will continue to work together to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and share God's love with all people."

Many churches across the Northern Illinois Conference displayed signs of welcome to the LGBTQ community. Bethany of Fox Valley UMC signage was changed to read, "We are not changed at all! No matter who you are, you are all masterpieces of God." In Rockford, several clergy stood outside near a busy intersection with signs that read, "God loves LGBTQ people and so do we."

What is the next step for the UMC?

Since the legislation is not the official church law until January 1, 2020, the bishops are urging all United Methodists to stay focused on the mission that glorifies God and reaches new people with the gospel. Bishops will be holding meetings with clergy and laity in their annual con-

ferences on how details will be handled in each area.

Homosexuality and the Bible

For many Christians, the subject of homosexuality is very difficult to discuss. For their entire lives they have believed the Bible, and therefore God has condemned homosexuality. They believe that to fully accept homosexuals is a betrayal of God and their religion. On the other hand, condemnation of gay people has also made many other Christians uncomfortable. Those Christians say our modern understanding of a loving God seems to be incompatible with those teachings. Not being a Biblical scholar myself, I wanted to find out what the Bible really says about homosexuality, not what I assume it says. When I announced that I wanted to do a Sunday School study about this topic, I'm sure that many people avoided the class because of the subject matter. Others joined the class for the first time. I want to thank everyone who did attend for allowing me to explore this topic, even though some of them had opinions in opposition to mine. Everyone was allowed to express their opinions without fear of embarrassment or ridicule. I think we all gained new perspectives, regardless of which side of the argument we were on. We of course could not agree on one definitive answer to the question. There are many respected theologians and Biblical scholars who can't agree. Only God knows, but I prefer to believe in a God who created and loves us all.

Depending on where you research the statistics, there are about eleven million people in the United States that identify as LGBTQ. Various studies have said that anywhere from four to eleven percent of the population in the United States are LGBTQ. Part of the problem in that variance may be the unwillingness of many to admit their sexual orientation because of the severe consequences attached to that admission. For the rest of this talk, I'll probably be using the terms gay or homosexual as all inclusive, even though they really aren't. Many of those eleven million gay people believe that God and the Church doesn't love them, so they reject the church that they believe has rejected them. Gay people are discriminated against in adoption, parental rights, housing, marriage, and in many other arenas of life. LGBTQ youth are four times more likely to commit suicide. Conservative Christian pastors have even spoken out, claiming that natural disasters are caused by God's displeasure with homosexuality. Many heterosexual Christians see the words and actions of the Church and no longer want to be part of organized religion because of our treatment of homosexuals. At a time when mainline Christian Churches are declining, there are so many people who need God. Why are we excluding them?

Everyone knows the Bible says homosexuality is a sin, or does it? There are about 31,000 verses in the Bible. Only six verses deal with same sex relations in any way. Many Christians believe in the inerrancy of the Bible. That means that every word in the Bible was given to its writers by God. Every single verse and every subsequent translation are the written Word of God. They believe the Bible to be a literal history, science and rule book by which we should live our lives. For those Christians, that is enough evidence to say that homosexuality is forbidden by the Bible and the discussion ends there. People who believe in the inerrancy of the Bible then have a very hard time reconciling the many contradictions and so many examples of a loving God that has somehow committed many acts of revenge, destruction, and killing.

Other Christians point out those six verses are far outnumbered by the mentions of God's love and how we are to love our fellow man. They further point out that while the many people involved in writing and compiling the Bible had a love of God, their writing was also tempered by the culture and events of the day, as well as their own personal views. Since many of the people in Biblical times did not know how to read or write, much of the Bible is composed of stories that were passed down verbally for centuries. Like a game of telephone, the original story probably changed as it was told and retold, until it was finally written down. After that, there is also the problem of translation. There are often no equivalent words between modern and ancient languages. Translators are then left to make their best approximation of the meaning of any given phrase or word. There isn't even an ancient word for homosexual. Progressive Christians also point to the fact that Jesus came to earth to be the Living Word. He never said a word for or against homosexuality.

The six passages that supposedly condemn homosexuality are often called the clobber passages. The book we used is this study was <u>Unclobber</u>, by Colby Martin, an Evangelical pastor. I chose this book because Evangelicals are often the loudest voices condemning homosexuality. Pastor Martin believes in the inerrancy of the Bible, but not in the inerrancy of our understanding of these particular passages. I also researched

several other books, both pro and con on the subject, as well as watching two excellent videos and a power point presentation from an eight week study done at the St. Charles United Methodist Church. We used these additional materials to supplement our class. If anyone is interested in learning more about what the Bible says on this subject, see me and I would be happy to let you borrow any of the materials.

Because of the time limitations, I won't be able cover everything that was discussed in our class, but I will talk about a few of the highlights. The first Clobber passage we discussed was the story of Sodom and Gomorrah. God supposedly destroyed the two cities because of homosexuality. Actually, when you read the whole story, two strangers entered Sodom and Lot invited them to stay at his home. Every other man in the town came to Lot's house and demanded he send them outside. They wanted rape the strangers. Rape is not about sex. It is about intimidation and domination. It would also be ludicrous to say that every man in the city except Lot was a homosexual. Lot even offered his two virgin daughters to the men, but they were only interested in raping the strangers. It just so happens that the strangers were angels that God had sent to destroy the two cities. The angels blinded the men of Sodom so Lot and his family could escape before the cities were destroyed. Many Biblical scholars say this story is about hospitality and the way to treat others, rather than homosexuality. If you read the entire story, it seems to have many exaggerations of hospitality and inhospitable behavior. I personally don't believe the details are accurate, and I don't believe that is important. Like Jesus' parables, this is a story meant to illustrate a point in an interesting way, not to provide an accurate account of events.

Leviticus says "You shall not lie down with a man as with a woman." Leviticus also says that this is an abomination. It does seem to be pretty straightforward. The confusing part comes in the translation of the words used in the Hebrew text that leave some doubt as to the original meaning. The reason for this doubt is too confusing for me to give you a competent explanation in the time I have here, just know there are many people who question the actual meaning of the original Hebrew texts. These two verses in Leviticus are in a section known as the Holiness Codes. We commonly think of holy as meaning religious or closer to God, but to the Jews it meant apart from or separate from the Egyptians, the Canaanites, and all other Gentiles. The Jews were instructed to be apart from them by living their lives differently. Leviticus gave them restrictions on how they could eat, dress, and groom themselves It gave rules on how to treat their slaves. It's where they learned an eye for an eye. It told them the penalty for a child who disrespects their parent is death. Leviticus gave the Israelites rules about business ethics, tattoos, menstruation, circumcision, and every other aspect of Jewish life among the many cleanliness rules. Abomination is a word that to us would represent something that is sickening or disgusting. To a Jew, it simply means contrary to nature. It was not about morality. It was about identity. As modern day Christians, we break many of Leviticus' cleanliness rules every day. To the ancient Jews, we are committing an abomination.

Paul wrote in Romans about how the people knew God, but they had turned away from Him and had committed many horrible acts, including men having sex with men and women committing unnatural acts. Because of their actions, God abandoned them. What was happening at the time Paul was writing this letter? The Christian Jews had been driven out of Rome by Emperor Claudius in 49 A.D. The only Christians in Rome were the Gentiles. When Claudius died five years later, the Christian Jews returned and there was a power struggle between the Jewish and Gentile Christians. As each group of Christians read this letter, they naturally believed that Paul was writing about the other group turning away from God. After they assume that Paul is on their side, Paul wrote that they were doing the same things and were no better than the other group. We are all saved only by God's Grace.

There is also a question as to why Paul specifically mentions these so called homosexual acts. It is believed by many that he could have been referring to the exploitative acts that were common in that time such as rape, temple prostitution, and pederasty, in which a rich nobleman would take a young slave into his household for sexual purposes as kind of a status symbol. Interestingly, the Bible does not mention anything about women having sex with women. Paul mentions women doing unnatural acts in these verses, but even that may not refer to lesbian sex. The early Christian church did not believe that passage had to do with women having sexual relations with women. Well into the fourth century, that particular verse was commonly believed to refer to any sex between a man and a woman that was not vaginal intercourse. Those acts were contrary to nature or an abomination. It should also be pointed out that in his letters, Paul tells Christians that it would be best to remain celibate like him, but if they are tempted by lust, then they should marry rather than to be

overcome with sin. Paul also said if you are already married and your spouse dies, it is best not to remarry. Paul didn't seem to have a healthy view of sex anyway.

Many Christians say they are against homosexual marriage because they only support the Biblical view of marriage. So, what is the Biblical view of marriage? While the Bible mentions weddings, it doesn't mention any type of marriage ceremony in a temple or church. There is also no mention of a ceremony being performed by any type of priest. Marriage was a business arrangement. I'll give you three sheep and you give me your daughter. Wives were considered property. Many of the heroes of the Old Testament practiced polygamy and had concubines. There are two creation stories in Genesis. In the first, God created man and woman equally at the same time. In the second, God took Adam's rib to create Eve. Those who prefer that version say that a man and a woman need to join together in marriage to achieve "oneness." What does that say to all the people who remain single either by choice or circumstances? Other Christians say that God created man and woman for procreation. Does that mean a married couple can only have sex for the purpose of having children? Is a healthy sex life therefore unacceptable in a Biblical marriage?

Many times during our class we heard the comment "I don't understand how a person could be attracted to someone of the same sex". Just because we don't understand, doesn't mean someone else's feelings aren't legitimate. While there is no current scientific proof of the cause of homosexuality, it should be apparent that it is not a lifestyle choice. To think homosexuals would subject themselves to abuse and ridicule just because they choose to is a ridiculous idea. To deny homosexuals the opportunity to have a loving relationship and all the rights, worth, and dignity of every other human being seems to oppose everything Jesus taught us.

Last Sunday, Pastor Oh's sermon was on the four plans the United Methodist Church is considering at a special General Conference being held this week in St. Louis. That Conference will determine our denomination's position on this subject. By the end of the conference they will vote on one of the four plans that Pastor Oh explained last week. It is also possible that the vote will be postponed to allow further study and discussion. Since the plans were described last week, I won't discuss them any further, except to point out that the Simple Plan is actually a return to the language in The Book of Discipline, pre 1971. From the days of John Wesley forward, our church had not felt the need to put any written restrictions regarding homosexuality into the discipline until 1971. The early Methodists evidently were more inclusive than we are today. It is difficult to challenge long held beliefs. The purpose of my talk today was not to offend or upset anyone, but to inform you and hopefully clear up some misconceptions that challenge us as Christians and specifically United Methodists. Thank-you!







Books Available in the Library By Kay Norfleet March 2019 Book Reviews

Again I ask you to read "The Help" by Kathryn Stockett. The book describes one example of extreme prejudice-racism. The Bible tells us clearly how to treat others by focusing on the negative and positive: You are aware of the passage that begins "Love your neighbor as yourself." And who is your neighbor? You know. You also know your feelings could apply to the Jewish, the Mexicans, the East Europeans etc. February was Black history month...we honored Martin Luther King. Well, at least we were happy to celebrate his birthday by not going to school, not having mail, having some businesses close. However, in the words of Martin "some day little children...and our people will be FREE AT LAST." I think he meant, Free as it applies to Racism, Jim Crow laws, racial division. "The Help" describes one type of life that Pastor King knew about: Some people in the sixties south experienced that racial division. But, in the book, they discovered HOPE. Hope that they may be Free from racial division, free to pursue equality with whites -what the whites can do.

"The Defender's Guide for Life's Toughest Questions" is an interesting book. It provides answers to questions that might be asked by atheists, and let's face it, some of us are "in the dark" about answers that should be given, answers that appear in the Bible that acknowledge our fallen world...and we fallen people who inhabit and make up this fallen world. Answers to the question about "why did God let Hitler exist." Why doesn't God step in as soon as He sees something happening that shouldn't, according to Him. God is merciful. God is the God of second chances. Men are sinners. In the end, Hitler and the Nazis were punished. But as someone whose relatives suffered under Hitler, I still don't After all, I'm imperfect. The book does quote from the Bible understand. and answer pertinent questions. Such as "why did God drown all those guys who were chasing his people." They'd been warned, says the Bible. Yes, I believe that's so. But could they understand the warning? Obviously not.

"Switch on Your Brain Every Day" are 365 readings for a thoughtful life. I especially appreciate Day 69's offering. Basically, it is that we don't know what we don't know- but God means whatever happens for good. That is so reassuring. Or Day 1 and Day 6, which exhort us to make choices. Make choices on what God says is right, do not be conformed to the world. Day 176 urges "thinker time." I guess that's a way to make long range choices, but for immediate choices it seems as if we must acknowledge the Bible, and that God's mind which is so much more complex than ours.

"The Prince of Egypt" (for the younger) is based on the Biblical non-fiction account of Moses. Disney thought it was worth a motion picture with some imagination events thrown in. Of course you need to read the Bible so you can discern where imagination prevailed. Being able to tell younger one the real story, then allowing him to read Disney's adaptation is necessary. So read and tell Exodus 2. You might allow how God turns events that look negative into positive...even though it might take a while.

SUGGESTED NEW MINISTRY

In a recent Upper Room devotional, the author talked about visiting a retirement center for fellowship and sharing with the residents. After reading this article, I was so moved.
