

Annual Conference Highlights



The 2019 Northern Illinois Annual Conference wrapped up June 4 at the Renaissance Schaumburg Hotel and Convention Center after two and a half days of worship, business, voting (and more voting), celebrating anniversaries, fellowship, speakers, and Bible study. While the theme was "Back to the Future" reminiscing about our 180-year history, much of the conversation and legislation focused on moving forward and what's next for the United Methodist Church and our annual conference.

2020 General and Jurisdictional Delegation Elected

After mastering the voting electronic keypads, annual conference members elected three clergy and three lay delegates to the 2020 General Conference and three clergy and three lay delegates for the Jurisdictional Conference, along with two clergy and two lay alternates. The diverse delegation includes some new faces and some who are serving again. General

Much of the legislation that passed at Annual Conference reflected the disapproval of the Traditional Plan adopted at February's General Conference Special Session, which emphasizes the current policies around homosexuality in the Book of Discipline for ordination and same-sex marriages while strengthening enforcement of those rules. Approved legislation included suspending payments to the General Administration Fund until changes are made to the structure and practices of General Conference. Also, a call to form a task force to explore a way forward for the

These strategic goals will be implemented over a two-year plan: To Grow and Reach New Disciples of Jesus Christ, To Live Out the Conviction that Racism is Incompatible with Christian Teaching, and To increase the Number of Highly Vital Congregations.

The **closings of four churches**, Elmwood Park, New Hope in Chicago, Pilgrimage Protestant Church in University Park, and

Lindenhurst Trinity were affirmed. We celebrate and bless the faithful ministries, witness, and legacies of these churches, pastors and members down through the years. A Sunday of Solidarity for Suffering Children | Sunday, June 30

In light of the recent news about children in U.S. government holding facilities along the U.S.-Mexico border, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has received numerous requests to respond. We have heard the plea for action from the church. Unfortunately, the facilities in question are managed in such a way that precludes even UMCOR's assistance. Access to these government facilities is extremely limited.

As the arm of The United Methodist Church mandated to cultivate and promote mission, the General Board of Global Ministries seeks to equip your church with tools to use as you confront the frustration and helplessness that this situation evokes. While this particular case is in the U.S., we recognize that migration is a global issue and the breadth and depth of our Global Migration programming at UMCOR and Global Ministries reflects that fact.

As a church that is united on the need to care for children, we can be in mission together.

This Sunday, June 30, Global Ministries encourages you to take part in A Sunday of Solidarity for Suffering Children in three ways:

- PRAY We encourage you to pray for children. Below, you will find a prayer to use this Sunday. You might choose to dedicate a service to suffering children everywhere or conduct a prayer vigil in your community for the children suffering along the border.
- 2. ACT We encourage you to act on behalf of children. While we cannot take UMCOR hygiene kits to the U.S. government holding centers, we are distributing UMCOR hygiene kits at transitional shelters all along the US-Mexico border. In the last three months, UMCOR delivered 46,128 hygiene kits to six church-run transitional shelters. You can also act by calling your U.S. elected officials. 3. GIVE - Finally, we encourage you to give on behalf of children. Through the Global Migration Advance (https://advance.umcmission.org/p-525-global-migration.aspx), UMCOR provides grants to organizations along the U.S. border and elsewhere around the world that are working to fill gaps in the needs and rights of migrants.

Prayers for the farming community

You may have heard of the old saying..."knee high by 4th of July" used by farmers back in the day to measure the height of their corn ... but stalks will unlikely be even ankle high this year across parts of Illinois and the Midwest. Many farmers ended up planting late or not at all following the extremely wet spring and continued rains.

Bishop Sally Dyck encourages churches this Sunday to pray for our farming communities. "We are mindful that this year's crops are greatly affected by the devastating rains and

many farmers are anxious about what the harvest season will bring," said Bishop Dyck. "Let's continue to keep our farmers and their families in our prayers."

The State of Illinois has launched a comprehensive website, www.lllinois.gov/2019floods, dedicated to disaster recovery for those impacted by the spring floods including farmers. Resources include damage reporting tools, fraud alert information, and a free mental health helpline.

"As a lifelong farmer I know firsthand how stressful farm life can be in a normal year, but this year has been exceptionally hard on our farmers not only financially, but mentally," said John Sullivan, Director, Illinois Department of Agriculture. "If you need help please reach out to someone. Know you are not alone in feeling the pressure to secure your crops." Read more.

NO DISTRACTIONS, NO MENTS DISCUSSED (although there are some), PEACE. We shouldn't focus on differences among us. God made us all...there should be no differences. OK maybe that's too "pie in the sky" but we can try. By reading "Powerful Prayers" our thoughts and ways are directed to our sameness-the way GOD intended. God made us! Thanks, and praises all to HIM Who gives help, encouragement, love, forgiveness, insight, WISDOM, and so much more. We, at Lemont Methodist, need to PRAY...there's no other way...PRAY that the current Traditional versus One Church Plan is settled ... somehow allows our church to continue TOGETHER. Look at the chapter on page 85 of "Powerful Prayers" and think about the concept: praying for those we disagree with or, for example, Conservatives praying for Progressives? Let's all just realize that we are in church to WORSHIP. This book reminded me of several things: Jesus on the cross, cried out "Father forgive them...." "The reason God asks us to forgive is because unforgiveness is a sin, and GOD HATES SIN." The book reminds many of the chapters point out how. My thoughts: Jesus was forgiving. Shouldn't we in prayer forgive others and ask God to forgive us? I don't know about you, but I don't want another sin added to my heavy load...although through prayer every day I am able to have my sins forgiven. Praying is not something to be done when the mood strikes or another distraction takes its place, it is a command. John Wesley's mother used to throw her apron over her head to create a quiet space for prayer...certainly each of us can find some place or create some situation that says to others "don't bother me."

Then, through "Radical Prayer" we become prayer radicals, as the book admonishes "link every praise, petition, to the hallowing of God's name; and seeing every answer to prayer as a catalyst to take God's love to all those He brings our way." That way and after praying for wisdom, knowing The Word, each of us will have a chance to introduce them to Him and His way. Pray for understanding of the people in our church, community, state, and nation. There are chapters that address all these and many other subjects. So much of what is happening is causing people to say "my way or the highway." Shouldn't we all be able to agree to disagree? There are so many points on which we do agree...just be at church and see. God wants us to depend on Him, His Way, to live in a community, our neighborhood, our town, the state, the nation today. Pray that you do. He created our world and gave us free will...let's not misuse it. We need to trust Him to guide us. Pray for His trust. Understanding others, that's one thing each of us needs to pray for. God wants you to listen to Him. He'll give you understanding or maybe just patience to deal with that scalawag...and then the scalawag will become..... Or maybe you're the scalawag...just sayin'. As Moses and Elijah and several others in Bible said, their simple prayer "Here I Am, Lord. "They didn't petition, they didn't do much of anything, they just realized that they needed to LISTEN to the ONE in CONTROL." Pray persistently after you hear God's leading...pray, pray, pray....

"WHAT IF GOD WROTE YOUR TO-DO LIST? 52 ways to make the most of every day" This is not the to-do list that you have written for every day...it's what God suggests...remember we have free will, so we're not beholden to do anything...but if we're wise we might pick up a few ideas here. For example:" Matthew 5:16 " Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven. If we do good works without telling others Who we serve, we get the glory ourselves. ...That's not the plan. That glory belongs to God....We should be someone who always tells the truth, gives credit where credit is due, respects authority, "and perhaps help someone who cannot afford their groceries, helps them carry their groceries WITH A SMILE, visit or call a shut-in...but do something that gives God the Glory...PTL by showing others that you are only following HIS WISHES to be kind, thoughtful, and helpful. Be sure that they see you are acknowledging HIM, and if necessary use words.

In a recent Upper Room devotional, the author talked about visiting a retirement center for fellowship and sharing with the residents. After reading this article, I was so moved. 
