The New Wine

Dear Members of Lemont UMC,

Greetings!

It has been tough months since our church was struck by lightning which damaged all of our computers, phone lines, and security systems. Also, our beloved and faithful church members have been diagnosed with cancers and lost loved ones. Moreover, Hurricane Dorian swept away Bahamas and killed so many innocent lives. As I heard from my brother, Typhoon Ling Ling destroyed his farm in S. Korea. Frustrations, grieving, and even anger, we have experienced in the past few months and some of you have been there in certain times in your life. What can we do when these things happen to us? We have all struggled with this question in life, wondering how God could let such a thing happen.

Non-believers point to these things and wonder how one can still believe in God when you've seen something like that? It is easy to feel like we were being punished and think "this must have been God's will because everything happens for a reason." The question is traditionally posed in this way, "If God is loving and just, then God must not be all-powerful. Or, if God were all-powerful, God must not be loving and just." For if God were all-powerful and loving and just, then God would stop the evil, pain, and suffering in our world. Theologians have a special name for the attempt to resolve this problem: they call it *theodicy* from the Greek words for God and justice. Theodicy is the attempt to reconcile belief in a loving and powerful God with the suffering present in our world.

There is no doubt that there is suffering in the world and that things go horribly wrong in the lives of faithful people. It's easy to reason that if we are "good" people, go to church, give generously, work hard and serve others, then we are guaranteed a good life. We live with a set of assumptions about how the world is supposed to work – and how God is supposed to work. When God does not meet our expectations then we are disappointed, disillusioned and our faith can be shaken and think what I did wrong or what I could have done more of. We feel like we are being tested. When we look at the Bible, we find that *most* of God's chosen leaders faced immense challenges in their lives and some were persecuted and tortured *because* of their faith in Jesus. Jesus himself told his followers to expect persecution. The Bible definitely does *not* teach that those who follow God will have a life of bliss. It describes the steadfast faith of those who continue to trust in God despite their suffering, and the comfort, strength, and hope they find in the face of suffering.

To give some answer to the human suffering, the earth has natural processes that help sustain life on the planet and sometimes people get caught in the midst of them. The same rains that cool the planet sometimes cause massive flooding. The plates of the earth move and keep our planet's core from overheating and exploding, and those living near those fault-lines are at risk. Human decisions affect our to cause suffering on a massive scale at times. God gave humans free will, and our decisions to impact the lives of others is very real. God does not impede the free will of one person in order to change the life of another. That human beings are continually drawn to the wrong path through sin and that causes harm and suffering to others is part of the gift and curse of free will. But we still believe in free will and fight for that freedom.

Humans with free will have the ability to make choices that lead to pain and suffering such as we saw in the Holocaust, or it can lead to healing and health, community-building and peace. Thousands of others made choices to either participate or to not do anything to stop the horror. The whole war only ended when others finally fought back, realizing that the evil must be stopped and they were the ones to do it even if it came at a great cost. Rejecting God in the midst of suffering only cuts us off from our greatest source of help, comfort, strength and hope. It leaves us utterly alone, which can lead to bitterness, loneliness, anger, frustration, and despair. Being a Christian doesn't guarantee a perfect life, free from suffering, but for us, suffering never has the last word. The stories of the Bible remind us that God continues to work to bring us through it all. All things work together for good and on the third day, Jesus rose from the dead. He is our greatest hope! God does not bring unjust suffering upon God's children. Instead, God walks with us through the floodwaters, rivers, fire, Hurricanes, Typhoon, and storms throughout our life. God promises that the present suffering is nothing compared to the coming glory that is going to be revealed to us when our time comes.

Good news is, now, our church office as well as the Happy Hands office has been functioning as normal with brand new computers and updated software programs after the lightning by the help of our Trustees, especially, Bill and Jana Stelter, and our technician John Velo. Our church phone lines and security monitors will be repaired and replaced soon. We collected \$1925.00 for the Memorial Fund for Adam Janssen's children: Emma and Jacob and I delivered \$2,000.00 to the Janssen's family this morning. Our church also raised a disaster relief fund for the people in Bahamas and will send it out to UMCOR. My brother rebuilt his damaged buildings and green houses by getting some financial help from family, friends, and the government aid and nowadays, he runs it as normal. We sent out our prayers, cards, meals, and our presence to those who have gone through chemo treatments and those who have been grieving. Our congregation are not the people who stayed in the valley of death, resenting and blaming God and others, but the people who overcome the suffering by prayers, presence, generous donations, committed service, and support. By serving others, we find joy in life, continuing our journey together. May God bless you and give strength every moment to find true joy of life in the midst of storms by serving others.

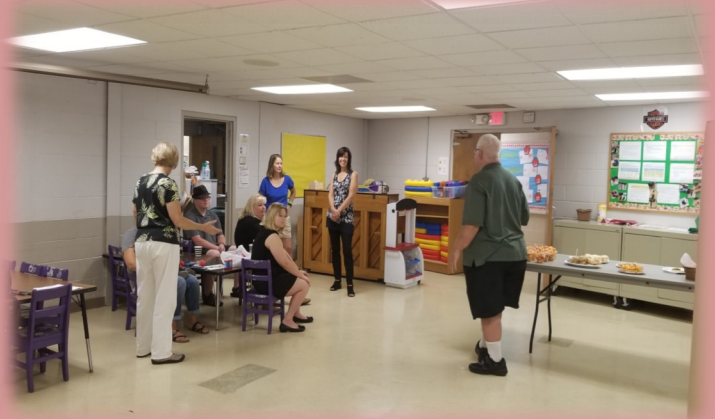

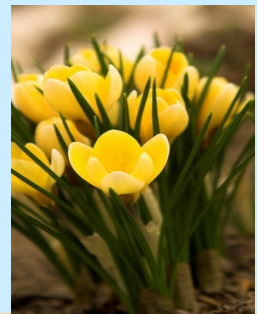
Dear Care Bearers,

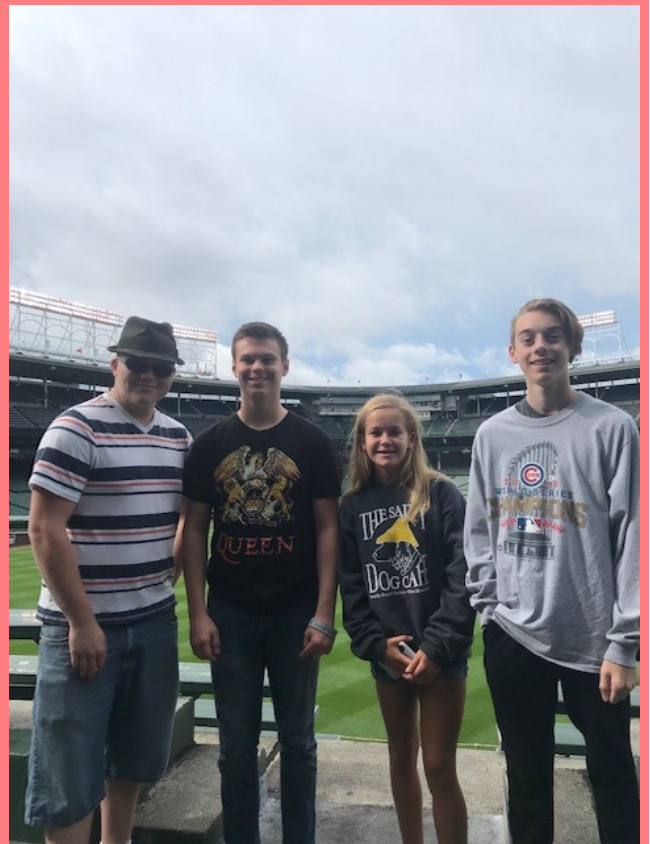

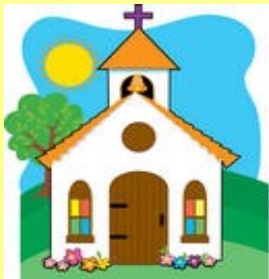

The DVD of "Where the Red Fern Grow" tells the story of the love of dogs, and the love dogs give. That's really it. Billy, a boy who lives in the country part of the Ozark mountains during the Depression and yearns for hound dogs. His father can't buy them for him, so Billy works and saves his money and after several years has enough and buys Dan and Ann (that's the name of the pups.) He trains them to be fine hunting dogs, and they do become fine, also devoted to their master. What happens then is tearful, yet so many teachable moments are in the film: Respect for parents; the need to work for something you really want-notice Billy never whined about his parents not having the money to buy the dogs; LOVE, that's in all that happens, how people treat each other, how the dogs are treated, and lastly acceptance. The dogs are so cute, then grew so handsome; the characters: Billy, his father, mother, and sisters are so respectful and loving of each other; the friendship exhibited by all; in fact the whole story, a classic by Wilson Rawls, thoughtfully entertains

Another offering for kids. "7 Days of Awesome" (older ones, here's another opportunity for you to read.) The Creation is about God's plan, His Design of the world. What boys and girls and all of us see all around. Questions and answers might spark the interest of a young one, might feed him the knowledge that GOD HAS A PLAN. And that Plan is for you and me. He has made a world for us to enjoy (and take care of, and learn about). What a privilege! (What we do in it is another matter)

Also, along the same lines of thought, I have "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn." This is the story, written by the popular author, Mark Twain. Huck runs away from home and finds adventure, knowledge, and friendship in God's wonderful world. Besides, he meets and learns to deal with all kinds of people...now that in itself is a whole pack of KNOWLEDGE. (A book for maybe 14 years on up-age wise, that is.)

And finally, for adults, "Help, LORD! I'm Having a Senior Moment." Short thought-provoking essays. (Actually these aren't all for seniors.) For instance- A woman who gets up on Sunday at 6 A.M. to go to 9 A. M. church. (And no, she doesn't live far away from the church,) She's into beauty techniques that become a bit more time-consuming for older women. But, she finally recognizes, and is so very grateful that the Lord is looking at her heart and not at her skin. What a reminder that beauty is as beauty does. Also the prompt that we "older ones" have the responsibility of passing on our faith to the younger generation. Each day each one of us should strive to that end. (That's in the short story "Bossy.")

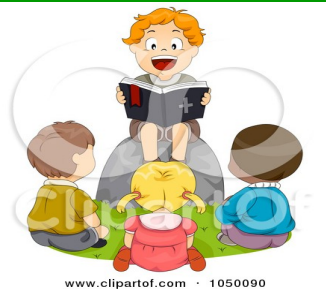

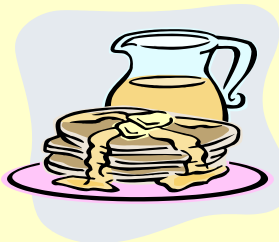
