Sanctuary Volunteers Are Needed!



The Greatest Age by Richard Hoyt Lee

I had a dream one night recently about the coming of the digital age and how we had to learn a whole new terminology and vocabulary. It really was welcome because it made acquiring data and images much faster and we could process or modify data easier. But then we had the same old problems of where to store data and images with new things called, "media," such as files, folders and drives.

We are still learning and perfecting this digital technology with issues of identity, signatures, security, and recognition. But then I began to cross over into another age, which is really not new but being rediscovered. That is the spiritual age or the field where it is not possible to quantify or digitize ideas like emotions, peace, love, and freedom. Unlike the digital realm, we have issues of good and evil, right and wrong, anger and love.

In the digital we can describe identity or characteristics but not things like the soul or worth. We need a new set of terminology and principles for spiritual concepts and this is where psychology and theology become useful. I have always enjoyed psychology and it was my favorite course in college with issues of emotion and ethics. But when I began to read the Bible, a new understanding opened up as I entered the spiritual age. I grew up with the digital age in the late 1970s but the spiritual came much later and I am still a child in the Spirit but not a baby.

I have been writing about or journaling what I'm learning from the spirit with references to the Bible in "The Greatest" and in stories or parables of illustration. The last year or two I have been studying the spiritual disciplines with the aid of my new Reformation study Bible, which incorporates many doctrines with Biblical background. Silence without distractions and study are most useful in this realm.

Stewardship Minute

This is the next in a series of articles about stewardship. In these articles I will try to inform you about the many ways you can contribute to your church's programs.

“Capital Repair Fund – Part 2”

Several years ago our church determined that some serious repairs had to be made to our roof structure and that our kitchens had to be brought up to code. It was decided to establish the Capital Repair Fund so that members could support this program directly. Now, if we were building a new church, this would be a Building Fund and we would be borrowing money from a bank, paying it back over a period of many years.

Instead, we decided to borrow the money from ourselves! Yes, we asked if there were any members willing to make a loan to the church and have it paid back as the church was able to do so. We offered to pay interest on these loans at 3.5% annually, a rate lower than we would have had to pay for a bank loan, but higher than the members would have received from their money just resting in a bank.

We also borrowed from our church's Endowment Fund, a fund established by major contributions for the future purpose of some church improvement.

As I described in last month's New Wine article, the church will soon be paying for some expensive electrical supply repairs and foundation waterproofing. In addition, there will be new concrete walks to provide access to the lower church entrances for Open Pantry people and Happy Hands parents and students. All of this work will total about \$90,000 and so, after a loan from our Endowment Fund of about \$20,000, we will be needing members to loan the church a total of about \$70,000. We will again be paying 3.5% in annual interest for these loans.

If you feel moved to help out your church in this way, please contact Don Mueggenborg and let him know your intentions. He will give you instructions as to handling your loan payment to the church.

It is often said that a church consists of its people and their outreach mission doing God's work, but the church building is also a witness to the village it lives in. It is here for the many groups that meet and worship in it. This church was given to us by worshipers over the years and it is up to us to be sure that it will be here in the years to come for those that follow us.





“Stories for the Heart” is a book of short non-fiction stories. All are encouraging and each gives you something to think about, something to be thankful for. The book is the compiled works by Alice Gray and features writers such as Billy Graham, John MacArthur, Max Lucado, Joni Eareckson Tada...so many writers that you would recognize as Disciples of the Faith. Ms. Gray has put together stories, non-fiction mostly, that point out our God-given human compassion and God's grace...God moving in lives. I think you will be blessed by each entry. I hesitate to say these are all non-fiction, some fiction such as “The Gift of the Magi” is included as is part of “Raisin in the Sun.” Both touch on the principle of love...and both are stories for the heart. The description of “Contentment is...” is one story that makes you think, and then think again of how many times you (or someone) has judged someone else.

“If I'm Forgiven, Why Do I Still Feel Guilty?” by Bernard Bangley is a book that maybe answers your questions about how you feel if after you've confessed to God, you still don't know. For me, I know I need to go over the ten Commandments with a fine tooth comb, because I'm sure that SOMETHING will stand out, SOMETHING I haven't confessed will dangle in front of God. Oh brother! But there is that verse from Psalm 116:1 that is comforting, “I love the Lord, for he heard my cry for mercy”. Here is a stinker which appears daily: resentment-why does the government require this and that, why does someone else have a nicer car, house, coat, on and on. Unless you have forgiven the system, the person, the institution etc., you will never feel forgiven. How do you forgive an institution: I'm not sure, maybe control your thoughts so that you can think kindly of it. What about killing bugs? Questions, questions.. You know, this topic might make a good Bible study

“Out of the Salt Shaker” by Rebecca Pippert. Rebecca Pippert writes in a easy -to -understand way. She puts it to us that we Christians ought to operate in life with non-Christians. Christians are to share their faith by seasoning non-Christians. She uses the image of a salt shaker as the place where we Christians live and interact with other Christians. She wants to be able to shake us up and out of the shaker into the world so we can do what Christ asked of us. Rebecca gives us several ways this can be done, telling or showing, or telling AND showing. The images are clear, they're just another way of reminding us to EVANGELIZE.

“Women of the Bible” (another Paula Janssen book). First, of course, was Eve. “in the story of Eve, we find reason for being and the beginning of misery and the sure hope that life is eternal.” “Even though Eve's was the first sin” (eating from the forbidden tree), and tempting Adam to do so. “Adam was held to be more responsible for, as legal head of the human race, he had plunged all posterity into misery.” And then there was Deborah. Deborah was a “strong and courageous woman who became Israel's Joan of Arc to rout the enemy and restore freedom” She inspired her people to look up to God for their power. She is an example for the women today in politics, IF they work for God's will. Next Mary, mother of Jesus, whom we all know as the young girl of unshakable faith. And don't forget the faithful friend Priscilla. Elizabeth, Lot's wife, Hagar, Miriam, Naomi, Anna, Martha....so many women make the Bible come alive.



Vacation Bible School



LUMC WORK PROJECTS FOR SUMMER 2016

With the arrival of spring weather it is a good time to note the number of projects which the Board of Trustees has scheduled for the near future. At times our work list has looked endless, but through hard work the Trustees have narrowed the list down to a few critical items.

We are starting on a special landscaping project in a few weeks. The Board of Trustees has noted the deterioration in the landscaped areas on both sides of the church. Despite regular efforts at spraying and hand weeding, the planted areas on each side have become less appealing. We are planning on removing some of the smaller plants while keeping the healthy trees and shrubs intact. The garden committee will be identifying the planted areas that need to be removed. We also will work with our local Scout Troops to remove the deteriorated landscaping walls and replace them with new stone. Access to the lower level doors has in the past been via the driveway and we plan to move the landscaped walls closer towards the north church wall and install much needed sidewalks from both parking lots. This will allow safer access for children, parents, food pantry patrons and church members. Grass is going to be planted instead of the ground cover and mulch. Church members are welcome to dig up any of the Vinca ground cover that they would like to transplant at their homes. We will encircle the sections of Vinca using bright orange paint and you may come to remove anything within the orange circles on both sides of the church before May 14th.

A second project will start on the south side driveway area. We have had frequent flooding through the south church walls during rains. This project will involve ComEd, Fail Safe Electric, U. S. Waterproofing, Arris Architects, and AMSCO Engineering in replacing the access piping for the main electrical line to the building. The line runs under the south driveway and the work will be scheduled to begin in late June when children are not in the building. There will be some trench excavating done across the driveway and along the walls of the church.

When these projects are completed we will need to resurface and restripe the parking lots and driveways. Hopefully this can be done before late fall.

We are trying to keep costs as low as possible, but we will need the help of the congregation for these summer projects. Donations to the Maintenance Fund at LUMC will be important and greatly appreciated as we try to keep our church safe and sound.

Our final project will involve assessing possibilities for improving the handicap accessibility of our church. As everyone is aware we have significant needs to make both levels of our church available for anyone to use for worship and programs. This long term project will take time to assess and review carefully.
