PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Members of Lemont UMC,

As many of you heard, Bishop, John Hopkins, of Northern Illinois Conference announced that he has appointed me to serve a new congregation, Roselle United Methodist a, Roselle, IL, as a lead pastor and Rev. Timothy Casey to Lemont UMC, effective July 1, 2021

These announcements of new pastoral changes, on one hand, may shock many of you. On the other hand, the news may be a relief for others because I've been serving LUMC for five years, one of the longest pastors in two decades. As I've been processing this transition, I was touched by Romans 8:28. It says, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." I am convinced that it is God's answer to the prayers of us. Undoubtedly, suitable for both of us.

Before they are ordained or licensed, clergy in The United Methodist Church agree to serve and go where their bishop appoints them.

John Wesley's traveling to preach place to place to begin the Methodist movement led to the itinerant system The United Methodist Church uses today. Appointments are for one year at a time. For elders and local pastors, particularly, the goal is to match the gifts and graces of the particular pastor with the ministry needs of a particular congregation. Thus, the local churches get used to pastoral changes every 5 to 6 years on average and many more years if things work well with the pastor and the local church.

I am convinced that Bishop and the Cabinet matched our gifts and grace with the profile of the local churches and have appointed me to Roselle UMC and Rev. Tim Casey to Lemont UMC. Please see the Bio of Rev. Casey on the following pages.

I want to let you know that I felt warmth and welcoming hearts from the SPRC members of Roselle and am excited to learn about and become part of the congregation at Roselle UMC and the community.

My husband and I have loved our five years at Lemont United Methodist Church and have seen God do some amazing things all those years. You have blessed us in many ways, so we truly appreciate you and cherish the time together with you. We will miss the community and the members of LUMC. While there is much we don't know yet, the one thing I can confidently share with you is that God makes all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose (Romans 8:28).

I will do my best to make the transition as smooth as possible within the next two months. I am still in charge of this church until I leave, and I have a baptism scheduled in May. 



Exodus talks about the exit of the Israelites from Egypt. It happened after several miracles performed by Moses...miracles that were a gift of God. Miracles freed them from slavery and allowed them to leave Egypt, its people, and the pharaoh that had held them in bondage for so long. Moses who led the Exodus had been a shepherd when the Lord spoke to him through a burning bush. A burning bush that did not consume itself in the fire. When Moses saw this anomaly he approached the bush and the Lord told him what to do, but Moses protested.

However, the Lord gave him the courage to go and deliver His People, the Israelites. So Moses went to Egypt and performed the miracle plagues which finally persuaded the pharaoh. Even after their exit from Egypt into the desert and after experiencing rather harsh living conditions that God answered(and by this time I must think God's patience was getting thin) the Israelites forgot all He had done for them.

Ten Commandments: King James Version

God's Law, the Ten Commandments, is expressed in Exodus 20:2-17 (KJV) with the following: "I am the Lord thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.

1.Thou shalt have no other gods before me.

2 Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them: for I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me; And showing mercy unto thousands of them that love me and keep my commandments.

3 Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain.

4.Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labor, and do all thy work: But the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates: For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day: wherefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and hallowed it.

5.Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee.

6 Thou shalt not kill.

7.Thou shalt not commit adultery.

8. Thou shalt not steal.

9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.

10. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbor's."

Consider: We should try to live this way. We SHOULD do as the Lord wishes.

BUT God gave us free will, the ability to make a choice, however, He hopes we will make this choice. Exodus is an example of how and what He is and what He will do and what He desires.

For Free of Charge


